OGDEN, Aug. 30 .- This morning a force of 100 men was put to work at the Intermountain Fair grounds, building additional stalls for race horses and booths for exhibits; also making other improvements necessary for the big Four-State fair which opens next Monday.

There is no doubt the fair will be the largest and most successful exhibition ever held in the northern part of the state and equal to the state fair held in Salt Lake City. Northern Utah, eastern Nevada, southern Idaho and western Wyoming will be largely represented at the fair, both in exhibits and attendance. Special excursion rates have been granted by all the railroads entering in Ogden from the surrounding states.

There will be about 400 horses at the fair grounds for the races during the fair as well as the 15-day meet which begins Sept. 13. The horses include those that have been running in Montana and Nevada during the summer. The live stock show of the fair will

he the largest ever held here and will have entries from four states. Exhibit space in the merchants' and manufacturers' building is almost at a premium, on account of the large number of applications for space from the manufacturers of the four states and the merchants of Ogden.

The amusement part of the fair other than horse races at 2:30 o'clock each afternoon will be a wild west show at p. m. and 7 p. m., and a fireworks display at 9 p. m.
