CAPITAL CHATTER.

WASHINGTON, 3.—Colonel Boud-

not, the well known Cherokee re-

siding there, made an argument be-

fore the Commissioner of Indian

Affairs, today, in support of a peti-

tion filed by him, praying that he

be put in possession of the hotel

property at Vinita, Indian Terri-

tory. Colonel W. P. Adair, second

chief of the Cherokee Nation, with

several other members of the Cher-

okee delegation, and ex-Congress-

man Phillips, of Kansas, partici-

pated. The argument became so

warm that it was adjourned ten

days by the Commissioner. Boud-

not and Adair, however, continued

the controversy, in a heated man-

ner outside the Commissioner's

room. Finally each struck at the

other with a cane and they clinched

and fell to the floor. They were

then separated by a department

watchman before serious damage

was inflicted. The fight caused a

sensation in the Interior Depart-

ment.

A statement just compiled here

shows that of the seventy-six mem-

bers of the Senate, fifty-nine are

practicing lawyers, and that not

less than 219 of the total 238 mem-

bers of the House are also lawyers.

Besides these there are nine half

practicing lawyers, five bank-

ers, three capitalists, five manufac-

turers, two farmers, two millers,

one stone cutter, four editors, six

physicians, two teachers, one

minister. In the Senate, besides

the lawyers, there are eight mer-

chants or other business men, four

planters or farmers, one doctor, the

editor, one banker, one mine-owner

and operator and one Senator of no

profession or business unless it be

politics.

The adjournment of the South

Carolina Legislature without pass-

ing a registration law is a matter of

congratulation among the republi-

cans of that State. The bill drawn

up and submitted to the legislature,

if it had been passed, would prob-

ably have disfranchised the

colored voters in the State.

The matter must now go over un-

til next winter, and the republicans

think there is a chance of carrying

the State for the republican pres-

idential ticket.

Governor Hunt, of Colorado, has

received the following telegram:

who, after Senator was fired on, de-

clared that within 30 days the Con-

federate flag would be floating over

the dome of the Capitol at Wash-

ington.

During General Grant's visit here

and at one of the dinners given in

his honor, he was asked what city

among all he had visited he liked

best. The reply came, "Salt Lake

City." "Washington? I think it is

the handsomest city in the world."

This little story is one of many

that have shown that the ex-

President is by no means adverse

to taking quarters in the city

again.

It is said on good authority that

the State Department will make

proper return in due season to the

resolution of the House of Repre-

sentatives, calling for the correspon-

dence with General Mosby. The

story that the State Department

would decline, for reasons of public

expediency, to furnish the correspon-

dence referred to, is said to be

unfounded.

The acting Commissioner of the

General Land Office to-day made a

ruling, that in any case where a

title to Mexican land claims has

been confirmed by a District Court

and no appeal has been prosecuted

within five years prescribed by

law, a certificate from the clerk of

the court will be accepted by the

General Land Office as sufficient

evidence of finality of proceedings

upon the question of title. The

acting Commissioner also ruled

that in the event of its being found

that a confirmed claim is com-  
pletely surrounded by surveys already  
made by the United States authori-  
ties, other claims, even though  
older, there is no necessity of  
retracting in the field. "In the case  
of surveys already made, and the Sur-  
veyor General may, in his discre-  
tion, place a plat from the official  
notes of the approved surveys on  
file in his office."

The Treasury Department an-  
nounces the purchase of 150,000  
ounces of silver for the Philadel-  
phia mint.

The consolidated report of re-  
ceipts from the Internal Revenue  
for five months, ending Nov. 30th,  
shows an aggregate increase, com-  
pared with the same period last  
year of \$1,515,672.

Chairman Atkins, of the House  
committee on appropriations, is  
improving slowly, although he is  
not apprehend any serious result, unless  
the erysipelas should strike him,  
of this there is at present no appar-  
ent danger.

On the re-assembling of Con-  
gress next Tuesday, the first busi-  
ness that will be transacted in the  
House will be the report of the  
committee on rules, debate on  
which promises to be quite ex-  
tended.

More "Boronia" survivors.

The Italian bark *Giamonica*,  
which arrived this morning,  
brought passengers and crew of the  
lost steamer *Boronia* who were  
picked up at sea, 250 miles off the  
coast. All reported to be in the  
British consul for relief. They are in a  
very destitute condition. They  
suffered greatly in an open boat be-  
fore being rescued.

The sea was in metallic ho-  
liday, but on the evening of Decem-  
ber 3, a heavy fog set in, and the  
boat was lost. The sea ran very high  
during the night and the boat was  
of the mercy of the waves. The gale  
continued the next day. A bark  
was sighted but the crew were un-  
able to attract her attention. That  
night the sea calmed down. They  
were steering for Fayal. The  
weather moderated and the sea re-  
mained calm until midnight of the  
4th. Sharks followed them day  
and night until one was pierced  
with a boat hook and the rest left.  
On the morning of the 5th, the

rising, blew very hard, and they

changed their course from the east

to west, running before the wind.

They discovered a sail bearing di-

rect for them. At about 4 p.m. on

the 5th by waiting blankets and

kerchiefs and pulling direct for the

sail, they attracted the attention of

the crew on board and were taken

aboard the *Giamonica* and arrived

to-day. The life boat was last

discovered in terms of the

western breeze at Capt. Bonifacio

of the *Giamonica*, who gave them

clothing and necessities.
