### MURDERED AND CREMATED

**A Farmer Killed by Robbers While Guarding His Property.**

He Retained Complete Command to the End of a Smothering Struggle.

STERLING, Ill., June 2.—Robbed, murdered and cremated. That tells the story of the death of George Kaufman, who stood guard over his father's granary to protect it from thieves, who killed him at his post and sought to wipe out the evidence of his crime. Today his remains of him lie in a coffin, with his throat cut, his skull crushed and his head buried, in a covered casket of lead. There is no doubt as to the murderer, who committed the crime, but bloodhounds are on the trail.

George Kaufman was the son of Tobias Kaufman, a prosperous farmer living about five miles north of Sterling. He was 40 years old. Kaufman has two dwelling houses with a quarter of a mile between them. He has the old home for his present dwelling about a year ago, but could not use some of the buildings attached to the former residence. Last fall he had a granary built near the old residence. He asked his son George to take up his headquarters in the granary, and he went to the granary. George Kaufman began his vigil two weeks ago, and he has not left the granary since. He did not come out at the usual hour. The family went to bed without concern. Then the father started to get up early for the old house to investigate, accompanied by Charles Schneider. They went to the granary at 7 o'clock. There was a light in the granary, which had been nearly burned down and was still smoking. The granary was on fire. They were horrified to find on the top of it a smoking stick of dynamite. They tried to get out, but in a struggle with the clothing all succumbed. The dynamite had been placed near the granary and had nearly severed the body. A bolt hole showed that the murderer had cut the granary into two. The bodies lay in the neighborhood under suspicion, but there is no evidence to warrant their arrest.
