It seems to us bad policy to take fallen women into a community of pure young men and maidens, and boys and girls, with a hope of redecming them, and at the risk of polluting the already innocent, A more plausible way, it seems to us, would be to locate them some place where they are constantly under the eye of the police, and where immediate assistance can be given if required.
