

HOUSE OF COMMONS AGAINST A TARIFF.

Declares Imposition of Duty on
Manufactured Goods Injurious
To Commercial Interests.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED 254 TO 2

Balfour Says It is an Abortive Effort to
Embarrass Government on Issue
Not Before Parliament.

London, March 22.—As a result of the cabinet's decision yesterday to use no pressure upon its followers in regard to resolutions introduced by the opposition to commit the government on the fiscal question, a resolution introduced at tonight's session of the house of commons by John Stirling Ainsworth (free trade Liberal), was carried by a vote of 254 to 2. The resolution declared that "in the opinion of the house the imposition of a general duty on all manufactured goods imported from abroad not exceeding 10 per cent on an average and varying action to the amount of labor on these goods would be injurious to the commercial interests of the United Kingdom."

While the action of the cabinet yesterday left no opening for a critical party division, the decision of the government to evade an issue on the fiscal question for the remainder of the session, and the fact that this was the first go-by you please vote brought out a large attendance and good galleries. A strong Liberal whiff summoned the members of the opposition, and the Nationalists turned up in full force.

Mr. Ainsworth's resolution was seconded by Richard Cavendish (Unionist), who congratulated Premier Balfour for giving the house an opportunity to express untrammelled views on fiscal propositions. Both Mr. Ainsworth and Mr. Cavendish maintained that the vote would show a complete discrediting of Joseph Chamberlain.

Premier Balfour spoke briefly, explaining that he did not consider the resolution as anything more than an abortive effort on the part of the opposition to embarrass the government over an issue which was not before parliament. He recommended the followers not only to follow the policy he had adopted, but to follow his example by not going into the division lobby.

Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman attacked the government for its attitude. He asked if the question was of no moment now, why it was considered a critical party question on March 8.

Lord Hugh Cecil said he believed that after tonight the country would not take the tariff reformers seriously. The electorate would not rally to those who failed to rally to their own cause. The socialist movement, he said, dying, was only being galvanized into life by the genius of another investigation. The result of the division was greeted with cheers and laughter.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Lord George Hamilton, Sir John Gorst and nineteen other free trade Unionists voted for the Ainsworth motion, besides the whole of the opposition and 50 Nationalists. All of the government supporters had left the house after Mr. Balfour's speech.

The ministers were formally intimated that while refusing to countenance such maneuvers as Mr. Ainsworth's motion, they are fully prepared to give time for debate, that otherwise the time consumed by the government's fiscal attitude.

EVERY GERMAN WARSHIP A GUARANTEE OF WORLD'S PEACE

Bremen, March 22.—At a banquet in the town hall tonight given in honor of unveiling of a monument of Emperor Frederick, Burgomaster Paul made a speech in which he referred to the first German fleet having been sold under the auctioneer's hammer, and said that the model of the admiral's ship was in the Bremen town hall.

Emperor William replied, saying that when he was a youth he stood by the model and felt deeply enraged at the disgrace done the German flag. That perhaps showed him how to comprehend the task of the German empire. He had sworn an oath of fidelity to the flag, and that when he became the head of the government he would "do everything possible to let bayonets and cannon rest but to keep the bayonets sharp and the cannon ready, so that envy and greed from without would not disturb us in tending our garden or in building our beautiful house. I vowed," the emperor continued, "never to strike for world mastery. The world empire that I then dreamed of was to create for the German empire on all sides the most absolute confidence as a quiet, honest and peaceable neighbor. I have vowed that I will never let the sword when history shall speak of a German world power or of a Hohenzollern world power, this should not be based upon conquest, but come about through a mutual striving of nations after common purposes."

The emperor continued: "After much has been done internally in a military way the next thing must be the arming of ourselves at sea. Every German battleship is a new guarantee for the peace of the world and the less ready will our foe be to express untrammelled views on fiscal propositions. Both Mr. Ainsworth and Mr. Cavendish maintained that the vote would show a complete discrediting of Joseph Chamberlain."

BROCKTON FIRE.

No More Bodies Have Been Found in the Ruins.

SANTO DOMINGO SITUATION ACUTE

Caused by Postponement of Action
by United States Senate on
The Treaty.

COUNTRY CAN'T PAY ITS DEBTS

Morales Can Handle Revolutions But
He is Afraid of Foreign
Complications.

San Domingo, March 22.—The news of the postponement by the United States senate of action on the treaty with Santo Domingo makes the situation here acute and an internal uprising seems to be imminent, based on the cry that President Morales has been discredited in the United States. President Morales states that he is prepared to put down any revolution, but that a more serious matter, in his mind, is foreign complications growing out of Belgium's demand, presented on March 21. Belgium wants the customs receipts of the port of Santo Domingo to the extent of \$325,000 a month according to a former agreement on which no payment has been made for three years. This first demand is construed as a direct result of failure of the treaty between the United States and Santo Domingo. President Morales anticipates similar demands by other foreign powers which he will be helpless to resist. He says he wants to pay the public debts, but sees the ruin of the country with every port in the hands of a different foreign power and no revenue for the government. While he agrees he will try to pay the public debts, he has his blind faith that "right will triumph."

In the course of an interview with the Associated Press, President Morales today said: "It is entirely possible that the United States may have to send an ultimatum here on account of the Dominican government being unable, though not unwilling, to meet its obligations. It is entirely possible that the government may pay the sums due foreign governments unless the United States can procure from foreign powers a postponement of their demands. Otherwise the Dominican government will be forced to resist them. With the custom houses in the control of the United States, the resources of the island will develop speedily and all demands will be paid with the result that the country will be educated to peace and permanent prosperity."

With two Dominican ports now in the hands of the United States and the failure of the treaty, Dominicans believe that the grab game by the foreign powers will begin at once. An Italian cruiser was here a few days ago, but was ordered to Kingston. The American gunboat Castine is here with 150 men; the cruiser Chattanooga is at Samana bay; the Detroit is at Puerto Plata, and the U.S. is at Monte Cristi. Rear Admiral Sigsbee has gone to Guantanamo for consultation with Rear Admiral Barker.

With the seizure of the Dominican ports by foreign powers it is argued here that the Monroe doctrine will be nullified as regards this republic. With the United States in possession of two ports it would not be logical to oppose the seizure of other ports by foreign powers. At the same time the only hope of President Morales is that in some way the United States can secure a postponement of seizure by European powers. No steps to this end have been initiated here.

No reply has yet been made to the Belgian demand.

President Morales has about 1,200 men under arms ready to crush any uprising, but should the custom houses be seized he speedily would be without funds with which to pay his army, which would immediately desert.

The United States transport Sumner has gone to Kingston, Jamaica.

BRIBERY IN COLORADO.

Newspaper Men Appear Before
Legislative Committee.

Denver, Colo., March 22.—Managing editors and reporters of newspapers in which stories hinting at bribery of members of the present legislature have appeared from time to time were examined by the legislative bribery investigating committee today. The former stated that they had no personal knowledge that a large lobby was maintained at the state house during the gubernatorial election, and that they had the best of authority for the printed statements that money was spent as bribes, they declined to state the source of their information, because they were pledged not to do so.

GAYNOR AND GREENE.

Extradition Case Will Proceed on
Its Merits.

Montreal, March 22.—The application for a writ of prohibition on the ground that Extradition Commissioner Le Fontaine was not qualified to hear the Gaynor-Greene case was dismissed by Justice Davidson today, and the case will now be tried on its merits by Judge La Fontaine. Gaynor and Greene are wanted by the United States government for alleged frauds in connection with the improvement of the Savannah harbor. Attorneys for Gaynor and Greene have intimated that they will appeal from Judge Davidson's decision. If this is done it will postpone the extradition trial for a long time, as it will have to come before the U. S. bench of appeal of the court of the king's bench.

An appeal against Judge Davidson's judgment declaring Judge La Fontaine fully qualified to act in the Gaynor-Greene case has been entered.

Another protest on entirely new grounds has also been entered against Judge La Fontaine acting in the case.

Col. Humphreys Dead.

Washington, March 22.—Lieut.-Col. Charles Humphreys of the artillery corps died here today, aged 66.

Queen Alexandra at Lisbon.

Lisbon, March 22.—The British royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with Queen Alexandra and her party on board, arrived here today.

Frazier Is Elected Senator.

Nashville, Tenn., March 22.—The general assembly, in joint session today, canvassed the vote taken yesterday for United States senator, and James Frazier was declared elected. The vote: Frazier, 104; Brownlow, 22.

Suspected of Embezzlement.

Lawton, Okla., March 22.—B. B. McDuffie, a supposed broker of New York, who is vice president of the Federal Bank of Lawton, was arrested here tonight on the charge of having embezzled \$12,000 of the funds of that institution, and was held in \$2,500 bond.

JUDGE HOOKER CASE.

His Nephew Gives Some Rather
Damaging Testimony.

Albany, N. Y., March 22.—Former Postmaster A. R. Moore of Fredonia resumed the stand today upon the resumption of the assembly judiciary committee's inquiry into the charges against Supreme Court Justice Warren B. Hooker. He testified that prior to Jan. 17, 1899, four clerks were employed at the Fredonia postoffice, and that the work was being satisfactorily done, and that the appointment of five additional clerks, alleged to have been made at the behest of Justice Hooker, was not asked for by him.

Ora Caldwell, one of the five clerks appointed to the Fredonia postoffice in January, 1899, at the alleged request of Justice Hooker, testified that he did not go to work in the postoffice until July 1 following. He identified two checks, one for \$124.65 and the other for \$150, given him by the postmaster, and admitted that he had never performed an hour's service up to the time he received the checks. He was working at a locomotive works in Dunkirk at the time, he said. Caldwell further testified that he had never given any of the money received from the postmaster to anyone else, and that the first he had known of his appointment was when he was handed the check for \$124.65.

Maurice Hooker, nephew of the judge, testified that he went to Fredonia in January, 1902, remaining there until April 15, 1904, securing an appointment in the postoffice and attending the normal school. He said he never performed any service in the postoffice, that he received his first pay in February and each month afterward, amounting to the salary of \$400 a year. He said instead of doing the work in the postoffice himself he arranged with the postmaster to hire it done, the expense coming out of his salary.

Miss Caldwell testified that she did not think that Judge Hooker had done anything for her. A letter dated April 28, 1900, addressed to Beavers, from Judge Hooker, read in part: "The arrangements for the marriage of Miss Clark is all right and she will be delighted at what is being done for her. After this had been quoted to her she replied that she did not know Justice Hooker had been securing increases in her salary."

PEASANT REVOLT.

Five Hundred Arrests Made in
Dvinsk District.

St. Petersburg, March 22.—In connection with the peasant revolt there have been 500 arrests in the Dvinsk district, where besides sacking and burning property and compelling the owners to seek refuge in the towns, the rioters are killing cattle and felling trees.

In the Kieff district it is reported that forged documents have reached the local authorities ordering the sale of state lands to peasants at abnormally low prices. These documents are believed to have been circulated by revolutionists in order to promote a revolt of peasants.

The employees on thirty estates in the Libau district have gone on strike. Count Klenmichels' estates in Gomel have been devastated and plundered. Troops have been sent there to suppress the outbreak.

Notices have been posted in the Baltic shippers and the state cartridge factories inviting strikers to resume work and appealing to the men's good sense of the necessity for executing orders for the army and navy, with a concession of ten hours a day and eight hours for a night has been offered.

Sergt. Thompson Appointed Lieut.

Washington, March 22.—The president has appointed Sergt. Thompson of the Twenty-fifth infantry, to be a second lieutenant in the Philippine scouts, thus adding one more to the men's good sense of the army. Lieut. Thompson was appointed on his merits, having received high commendation for heroism and efficiency during the insurrection in the Philippines. He is one of the crack shots in the army, and has received several medals for rifle and pistol shooting. He is now stationed with his regiment at Fort Snodgrass, Neb.

Christian Science Practice.

Lincoln, Neb., March 22.—By a bare constitutional majority of 17 to 16 the Nebraska senate tonight passed the house bill outlawing the practice of Christian Science. The single amendment by the senate to permit osteopaths to continue to practise and this, the house managers announce will be concurred in. The bill will then go to the governor.

To be Assistant Engineer, Rocky
Mountain Division.

San Francisco, March 22.—F. C. Herrmann resigned his position of assistant engineer in the office of the city engineer today to take the post of United States government irrigation engineer in charge of the Rocky mountain division. His new field of wide embraces Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah and Colorado. His headquarters will be at Cheyenne, Wyo., and he will assume office at once.

Vesuvius Quieting Down.

New York, March 22.—Explosions of Vesuvius have abated, and the Herald's correspondent at Naples. The only sign of internal activity is an occasional light puff of material and smoke.



