CONDUCTOR DISMISSED— OTHERS DISCIPLINED

OGDEN, Nov. 18.—Supt. E. C. Mawson and associates of the board of inquiry into the recent accident on the Southern Pacific at Death, Nev., have rendered a report, part of which follows:

"Conductor W. H. Stone of Parkersburg extra 1780 dismissed for failing to put Greek extra gang laborer to protect his train while unloading gravel on main line, instead of using one of his own men."

"Engineer Frank Fagan of extra 1782 given 30 demerit marks for failure to be under control according to slow order which he received at last telegraph office."

"Conductor C. H. A. Gording of extra 1782 given 15 demerit marks for failure to see that his engineer obeyed the slow order."
