MORGAN ON PANAMA CASE. Says Landing of Marines Was Not Justified.

Washington, Nov. 6.-Senator Mor-gan said today that soon after Con-gress convenes in extra session he will gress convenes in extra session he will introduce a resolution calling on the foreign relations committee of the senate to obtain from the state de-partment a detailed report of the rela-tions between the United States and Colombia under the treaty of 1846. Ac-cording to Senator Morgan, the atti-tude of this country is not justified by a careful construction of the provis-ions of the treaty and is at variance with precedents laid down by the Unit-ed States. In discussing the situation today he said: "This is the fourth time the United States has landed troops on the isth-

"This is the fourth time the United States has landed troops on the isth-mus under cloak of the treaty. Here-tofore it has been for the suppression of rioting and for the protection of Co-lombia. Now that it is against the wish of Colombia, it undoubtedly will provoke a just protest. "Colombia means war. Of that I am certain. This government will find that it will have a series of complica-tions on its hands not unlike those of the Indians when they were met with the territorial aggression of this gov-ernment, and the trouble the Colom-bians will make will be similar to that of the Filipinos, with the conduct of warfare far more difficult. I believe, however, the administracion will not however, the administration will not have this matter to decide. It is a question for Congress, and that body is not likely to shirk the responsibil-

lty.

Court for Juvenile Offenders.

New York, Nov. 7.—In a statement covering the first year's work here of the new court for juvenile offenders Justice Julius M. Mayer, of the court of special sessions, asserts that the failure of parents to supply their children with spending money is one of the principal causes of crime among the boys and girls of New York City. Lack of knowledge of the first principles of practical civics, he said, is another reason found for innocent offenses of mischevious children, "In many cuses," he justice declares,
