CHRISTIANITY SPREADING
THROUGH JAPANESE EMPIRE

Washington, May 24.—Christianity is rapidly spreading throughout the Japanese empire. Ambassador Takahira is authority for this statement. He believes it has gained a strong foothold and, while it may require years to Christianize the nation, he regards it as entirely a question of educating the people. "The people of my country, as you are no doubt aware, are great students," said the ambassador. "They are thinkers as well as workers. They are a race who love to get at the truth, who love to investigate and ponder. I am telling you this in order that you may see how deep rooted are the religious of my country and how strong their hold upon the people. At the present time, so far as I am able to learn, the work of the Christian missionaries is bearing fruit rapidly. It is hard to say how long it will take to Christianize," continued the am-

bassador. "But my opinion is that it will take a long, long time. You see, therefore, that Christianity will not succeed in winning without a fight."

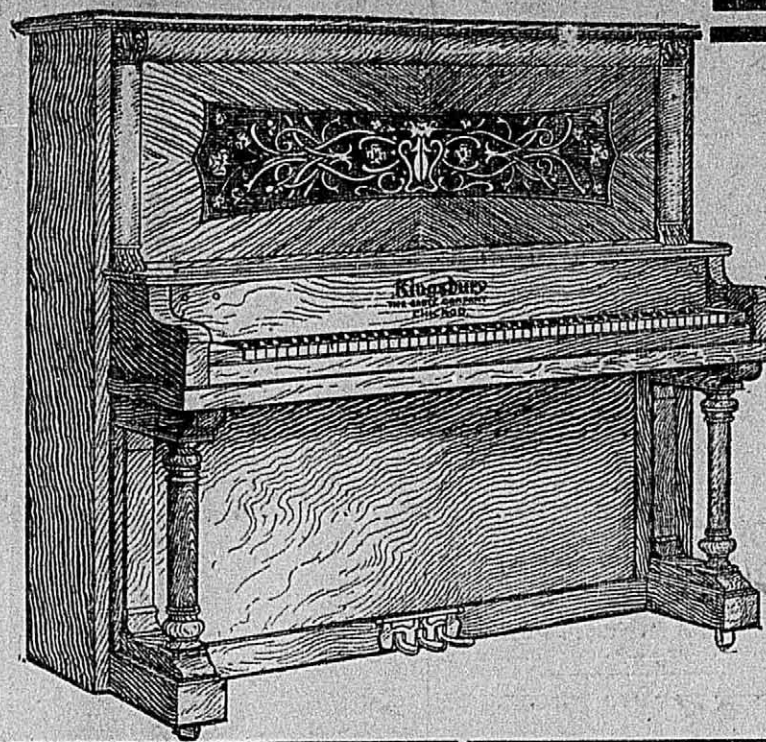
SLIGHT CLEWS TO
SHEEP CAMP RAIDERS

Glenwood Springs, Colo., May 24.—Half a loaf of bread and partially destroyed handkerchiefs from which masks had been made furnished probably the most important clues that

have so far been discovered in the search for the 15 men who last Wednesday raided a sheep camp near Atcheco, Colorado, and butchered between 2,000 and 3,000 sheep.

Word of this discovery was brought here today when Under-Sheriff D. Bliss returned from the hunt that has been conducted for the marauders during the last three days. He declared that he expected the posse to overtake the raiders within a short time and he added, "when this is done, there is going to be a surprise, for the leaders of the gang are known to nearly every one in Garfield and Mesa counties."

GREAT BRITAIN'S
NEW DREADNOUGHTS

They Will be at Least Thirty Per
Cent Superior to Their Im-
mediate Predecessors.

MUCH SECRECY ABOUT THEM.

Guns Are to Have Much Greater
Muzzle Energy, 55,000 Foot Tons
As Compared With 47,000.

London, May 23.—Reginald McKenna, first lord of the admiralty, in replying to criticism on the government's naval policy, said today that the battleships to be built under this year's program would be at least 30 per cent superior to their immediate predecessors. In what way that superiority is to be obtained has not been entirely disclosed, but at least two of the improvements to be introduced are known. In the first place, the 10- and 12-inch guns with which the ships are to be equipped are to have a greater muzzle energy than those now in use. These guns will be capable of developing a muzzle energy of 55,000-foot tons, compared with the energy of 47,000-foot tons of the guns on the Dreadnoughts.

In addition to this increased power, all the 12-inch guns of the new ships may be fired on either side. For this purpose the deck erections have been reduced to the minimum and the two pairs of guns placed in the center of the ship in barbettes on each wing, but arranged in echelon, can sweep through almost a complete circle and fire on the port or starboard side. The other three pairs of guns will be mounted in barbettes in the center line, one barrette being forward and two aft. In one of the latter the guns will be carried at a high elevation. This is considered an improvement on the arrangement of the big guns on the new American ships.

The 10 primary guns can also be fired on either broadside in the American ships, but all the guns being placed in the center line, the boat and stern fire is considerably reduced, there being no guns on the wing. Moreover, the experts consider that the American system makes it difficult to train all the guns at an acute angle to the fore and aft line of the ship.

The new British vessels are to be fitted with turbines to develop a speed of 21 knots.



THOMAS C. PLATT'S SON FIG-
URES IN U. S. EXPRESS SUIT.

A hot battle is on, backed by the minority stockholders of the United States Express company, to oust ex-Senator Thomas C. Platt and his sons from control of that property. A large number of the stockholders, employing eminent counsel, seek to force Edward T. Platt, treasurer of the company, to permit chartered accountants to examine the books of the corporation. Six members of ex-Senator Platt's family hold stock in the company, of which he is the president. The minority holders contend that their appeals for accounting from time to time have been ignored by the Platts.

GREAT MUSICAL FESTIVAL.

Names of Societies to Compete for the Kaiser Prize Announced.

New York, May 24.—The names of the five societies which compete for the Kaiser prize at the great musical festival to be held in Madison Square Garden from June 19 to 25, by the United Singing Societies of America, were announced last night. They are the Krueber Quartet club of New York; the choir of Wilkes-Barre, present holders of the prize; the Junger Maenner choir of Philadelphia; the Germania of Newark; and the Arion society of Baltimore.

The names of the judges were also announced. They are Professor Max Mayer-Obersleben, director of the royal school of music in Wurzburg; Prof. Gustav Woldemuth, director of the Leipzig Choral society; Max Spicker, the composer and conductor; Arthur Mess and Professor Cornelius Rubner, head of the music department of Columbia university.

DO FISH COMMUNICATE
CANCER GERMS TO HUMANS?

Buffalo, N. Y., May 24.—An investigation is being made by the Buffalo state cancer laboratory to ascertain whether fish communicate the germ of cancer to humans by their use as food.

Dr. Harvey R. Gaylor, head of the laboratory, has announced that they are now endeavoring to definitely discover whether cancer is thus communicated or whether the germs are in the water and the disease imported in that way. "There is no certainty that cancer comes from fish," said Dr. Gaylor. "We are conducting a very vigorous line of experiments however, to find out. The discovery that cancer exists among fish was first made by a French scientist. A study of fish has proven that the disease is quite common among these spe-

cies of animal life. It is found that the gills of fish are the parts affected. The disease is found in many varieties of fresh-water fish and many sea fish have also been found which are so diseased." While Dr. Gaylor was quite guarded in his statements it is known that officials of the state forest, fish and game commission are much worried. It is said that when fish are cooked the cancer germs are killed. If the experiments had to show that the streams of the state are infected by certain kinds of fish and the germs are in that way communicated to the human body it may mean their extermination in this state.

PUT CAUSTIC SODA IN BISCUIT
INSTEAD OF BAKING POWDER

New York, May 24.—As a result of eating biscuits into which she had by mistake put lye instead of baking powder, Mrs. Robert Tarry, is dead and her husband is critically ill at their home in Tottenville, Staten Island.

Mr. and Mrs. Tarry kept house for their bachelor son. A few days ago the son was away for a three days' trip leaving his mother, whose age is 79 years and his father, aged 78 years, at home alone.

Neighbors heard groans and poundings coming from the Tarrys' house yesterday morning and upon entering found the old couple in agony.

Doctors were called in, but their efforts to relieve Mrs. Tarry were futile as she died shortly afterwards and little hope is held out for her husband. Five unlabeled cans containing white powder were found in the kitchen. Four contained baking powder and one contained caustic soda and this is what was put in the biscuits.

CANADA NOT ALARMED.

Chicago, May 24.—A report that the Canadian government was alarmed at hearing that the American war vessel the Nashville, was bound up the St. Lawrence river, was denied here.

The report created amusement among government officials here. The Nashville is coming to the lakes to afford a training school for the naval militia. Its coming was announced several months ago and arrangements were made by the government with the Canadian government for the trip.

IN PARIS STRIKE.

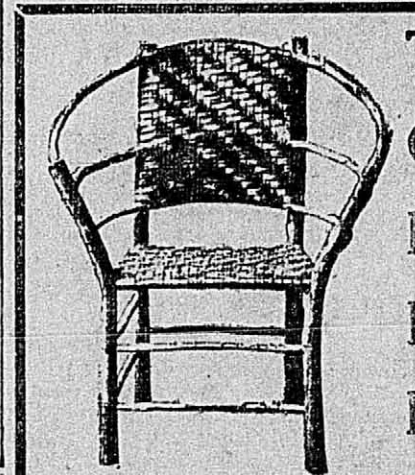

Young Merrill was so affected after the accident that he had to be placed under restraint to prevent him from carrying out threats of suicide.
