Religious Liberty Denied "Mormons" by Minister of Interior.

Under date of Sept. 26, Rev. Elder John A. Madsen, for the "News" from Temesvar, Hungary, he follows:

"The first Elders to preach the Gospel in that land were Anna Marlow and M. L. Lake, Oct. 1, 1880, and the latter Nov. 1 of the same year. Thenceforth these were invited into the Church by these Elders, since then Elders Henry W. Mathis, William A. West, Frank Plogue and John A. Madsen have labored here in that field. On account of police interference, Elders Plogue and West sent a petition to the Hungarian minister of Religion, signed by Elder Kortle and all members of the Church here, asking for religious liberty, and after 16 months waiting the answer has come. By one of the local papers, Temesvar Volksblatt, dated Sept. 26, under the heading, "The Mormons in Temesvar we carry the following: The minister of the interior has now, after 16 years of proving and after hearing the claims the Justice and Humanitarianism, also the Evangelical Reformed Academy has given the following decision: 'The petition of Frank Rother together with his companion, and Franklin Plogue and William A. West for permission to spread the Mormon religion in Hungary, has been found impossible to grant, while I am of the opinion that from state policy and religious standpoint it is not desirable, that this unknown doctrine incomprehensible religion should be spread by foreign missionaries in our countries.'

The decision by the government is a sad disappointment for the Elders and Saints, who expected it to be in their favor, but at the same time its effects are for good, as the fair minded people can see that the answer to the petition is as weak as water, and gives no logical reason why it should not have been granted. Several prominent men have told the writer this was only an excuse, and not an answer. Many people have enquired after us, who would have been impossible to reach were it not for the publication of the decision referred to.

Through emigration and moving to other parts this branch has dwindled to 15 members, but they are of the tried and tested kind, and some of them could set an example for some of us in Zion in regard to living up to the commandments of the Lord. The prospects are good for more honest souls to be added to the fold of Christ and the work is progressing as well as could be expected under existing circumstances.

Temesvar has a population of about 63,000 and is the commercial and distributing point of south Hungary. It has a tobacco factory employing 2,500 hands, a match factory with 400 hands, hat factory with 400 hands. With the exception of the overseers and a few others men the employees in the factories mentioned are all women and girls. Temesvar also has four or five large flour mills, besides a score of smaller concerns. Wheat and flour is exported by car loads from here to Austria, Germany and England principally. The city has four fine power complete electric R. R. system and the surrounding country is a rich agricultural district. Fruits and vegetables of all kinds are on the market in abundance, but the Hungarian grapes are the best fruit we westerners have found in this country.

I have been laboring here eight months now, having succeeded Elder Frank Plogue. I have enjoyed my labors very much and have been blessed with health and strength. We have made many friends but have not baptized any new members but associated prospects are good for a harvest in the near future. Elders Frank McIntyre and Pack have just passed through on the way to Brasso to release Elders Ender and Barker. The "News" and I are welcome visitors, and are read with pleasure and profit.

NEW BRANCH IN NORWICH.

Elders Ira J. Boyce and James P. Cameron, who for the "News" from North Walsham, Norfolk, England, write date of Oct. 6, as follows:

"We are working alone in this part of the land. About two years ago, Elders Bennett and others came here to take up residence. The first Elders to labor in this district for over 40 years. Within one year they organized a branch with 15 members, three of whom were old saints living here, faithful and true souls.

In the last year 15 members have been added, and there are bright prospects for additions in the near future.
