THEATICAL.—"The Lady of Lyons" attracted a fair house yesterday evening, considering that the play has been performed several times this season. Mr. McCullough's dramatic powers shone out brilliantly yesterday. His performance as Claude does not display great impetuosity, but it is a quiet and refined piece of acting. Madame Scheller's beautiful impersonation of "Pauline" is too well known here to require comments on our part. It was duly appreciated by the audience, and Madame Scheller and Mr. McCullough were called out at the close of the play.

Mr. McKenzie's Colonel Damas was indeed an excellent delineation. Mr. Graham's "Glavis" and the Beaumont of Mr. Lindsay also deserve special mention. All the other characters in the play were well enacted by the company.

Mr. Waldron again amused the audience by his comic specialty of the old French Actor.

NEWS FROM ECHO.—From General B. Young who is just in from Echo, we learn that the track is laid to within twelve miles of Echo Canyon and, if the weather continues as favorable as at present, the prospects are that in ten days it will have reached Echo. The ties are laid half way down the canyon already. Mr. Reed says he shall continue to work as long as he can, and shall not stop through the winter unless bad weather compels him. Echo City is growing rapidly, stores and other buildings going up as fast as building materials can be obtained. Lumber is fetching a hundred dollars per thousand, and the supply, at that price, falls short of the demand.

BRIDGE ACROSS MISSOURI DESTROYED.—The Omaha Herald of the 23d inst. contains an account of the completion of the temporary railroad bridge across the Missouri. The next day's issue of the Herald gives an account of the destruction of the same bridge. It appears that above the bridge the gorged ice in the bed of the river was so thick as scarcely to leave room for the volume of water to pass through, which washed out a large quantity of mud and sand, and loosened the piles from their foundations, when they fell into the crevices thus formed, the whole accumulated mass of ice then floated, sweeping away the entire bridge except about fifty feet on each side of the river, near the shore.

On the day following, the work of reconstruction was being pushed rapidly ahead. The pile-driver was in position, and immense numbers of ties, spikes and cross ties and iron, and other material were on the ground, and about a hundred men at work, and it was expected that the new bridge would be completed and trains running again in about a week.

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
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
