

'FRISCO SEES BIG FIGHT TONIGHT

Schreck and Kaufman Get Together With First Named The Favorite.

BATTLE MAY BE SURPRISE.

If Tall Boy Gets Busy He Has the Chance of a Life-Time to Make Start.

Tonight San Francisco's big pugilistic carnival of three big fights in 10 days will be started by the Schreck-Kaufman contest at the Auditorium rink, writes "Bud" Fisher. Three big fights coming as they do so closely together will have the attendance of all the contests, but as Alex Greggains gets first crack at the pay rolls of the wage-earners he figures that he will not be so badly handicapped as the other brace of promoters. Greggains has an attractive card from a slugging standpoint and as the time draws nearer considerable interest is being manifested by the sports in its outcome.

SCHRECK FAVORITE.
While Schreck will no doubt be installed quite a favorite in the betting, there is an element of doubt about the affair even in the minds of the strong Schreck men, and there are any number of the so-called wise bettors who will string along with the Kaufman end of the argument. Kaufman has not as yet been taken very seriously as a championship possibility, but with all that the big native son has been winning right along since 1904, his winning record and that is the principal point in pugilism.

TIPS ON KAUFMAN.
Kaufman is one of those fighters who has not been given due credit for his work. While he is by no means a world beater, he is a big strong boy, as a public, and there is no reason why the big native son should not be a star performer, able to cope with any man's fighter. Kaufman is not a showy performer. He is a quiet, steady fighter, and has not as yet learned the rudiments of ring generalship, which no doubt accounts for the backwardness of the public in giving him full recognition.

In instances in the Berger fight, Sam was installed a 10 to 1 choice over the blacksmith. Kaufman stopped the blacksmith in 10 rounds and yet it is doubtful if Kaufman was elevated a bit in the opinion of the fans. Instead of giving all credit for winning from the short end of the fight, the fans should be given credit for a knock-out.

MAY PROVE SURPRISE.
However, in Schreck, Kaufman will meet a seasoned fighter, and a man of reputation and Al will have a chance to show just exactly how good or how bad he is. If Al defeats the Cincinnati Dutchman the fans will be forced to recognize his class, and he will be in a position to mingle in the championship conversation. Although Schreck is highly touted east of the Rockies, he is far from being a demon, and it would not surprise the writer in the least to see Kaufman spill the fat man.

From recent appearances the contest will be a big betting proposition, and were it not for the fact that Greggains is staging the event in the Auditorium rink, the fight should be well attended. But the experience of those who tried to witness the first-Nelson contest in that pavilion will no doubt keep many dollars away from the box office.

KRAMER AND WALTHOUR.
Kramer and Walthour will be the stars at Friday night's doings down at the Salt Palace. Kramer is to try for Walthour's scalp at the latter's own game, that is following pugilism. A five-mile match has been arranged. It is thought the question of motors can be best settled by a contest between the two riders. The race ought to be a good one as Kramer goes in to win every time and there is cause to believe Walthour will do his best to come in first.

WHY SAMUELSON SLOWED.
Samuelson is explaining why he seemed to appear "all in" when riding towards the tenth mile in his contest with Walthour Tuesday evening. Instead of being tired about the eighth mile, "Sammy" explains a rubber strip on his machine came loose and the Provo boy lost his race for a second. Under a keep his wheel steady there was nothing to do but to come in first.

Amos Rusie, the one time famous pitcher, who had been earning his living as a lumberjack for the past two years, has adopted a new vocation. It is nothing more or less than that of a professional boxer. Amos has had fair success in bringing up the jewel-containing shells recently and is said to believe that with a fair run of luck he can do far better working under water than he can juggling lumber at 40 a day.

Yale is to have a new boxing master for the coming year, and a real pugilist, too. He is to be Mosley King, of New London, former lightweight champion of Connecticut. He was coached by Prof. Billy Dole, who came to Yale in 1871 and has proved a model boxing teacher. Dole refused to accept Yale to accept an American physical director at a school at Asheville, N. C.

Harvard oarsmen are interested in the arrival of the shell which was built in England this summer for the Crimson crew of next season. The racing machine, which was set up by the well known boat-builders, George Sims & Sons of Putney, England, was brought over by the steamship Cambrian and was put ashore Tuesday in Boston. The club stands third in the race, with 35 more games to play. The Rooters' club has raised \$2,000 to be divided among the players if they bring the Texas league championship to Dallas.

HARRIMAN WANTS WALKER SUIT DISMISSED.

New York, Aug. 28.—H. Harriman, through his counsel, has asked the United States circuit court to dismiss the suit brought against him and 27 other defendants by Henry M. Walker of New Jersey for \$500,000 damages. Mr. Harriman yesterday asked for a dismissal on the grounds that all other defendants resided in Oregon and California.

LARGER SHIPS FOR MOROCCO.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Telegraphing from Madrid the correspondent of the Matin in that city says that at a recent meeting of the cabinet it was decided to continue the policy of strict observance of the Algeiras agreement, but nevertheless Spain will replace the small warships she now has in Moroccan water by larger vessels.

POPE CO. CREDITORS.

Hartford, Aug. 28.—Creditors of the Pope Manufacturing company, whose claims aggregate \$750,000, appeared in court at a hearing on the confirmation of Albert L. Pope as receiver. It is expected opposition will develop against making the present receiver permanent. After a discussion of the subject of appointing the court reserved decision and adjourned the hearing to Sept. 16.
