The Oregon Short Line.-Mr. Tom Jessup, a contractor on the Oregon short line of the U. P. R. R., cammonly called the Granger line, is in the city, and made us a brief visit this morning. He says the work on that line is moving rapidly ahead, a large force of engineers now being employed. The grading is well-nigh finished from Granger to Montpelier, and the track is laid for a distance of 25 miles from the former place. It is confidently expected that the road will be ccompleted to Smith's Fork, 100 miles from ters Bear Lake Valley six miles east of Montpelier, and follows the Bear River to Soda Springs, through which town it will pass. Mr.Jessup's grading contract extends 15 miles east and west of this place, and at present he has a force of 75 teams engaged thereon. Teams and men are in demand, and employment can be had at fairly remunerative prices. Our informant states that the letter signed NEWS a week or two ago, wherein the actions of Mr. Dillon's nephews were made the subject of amimadversions, is greatly overdrawn.
