## MUST ANSWER TO SERIOUS CHARGE

District Attorney Halverson  
Charges Laurence Farse With  
Murderous Assault.

## DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST O. S. L.

For First Time in Months Junction  
City is Entirely Free From Con-  
tagious Disease.

Ogden, June 27.—A complaint was prepared last evening by District Attorney George Halverson, charging Laurence Farse with assault with intent to commit murder, on the person of Ora F. Page. The district attorney has personally given the case considerable attention, in order that he might be better prepared to prosecute the action. He yesterday afternoon, in company with an officer and complainant, visited the scene of the alleged murderous assault in Ogden canyon, and found the pocketknife belonging to Page on the mountain side, where he had stated it fell out of his pocket when Farse struck him and hurled down the steep incline. This is another point indicating that the young man has told the officers a truthful story.

Mrs. Farse, wife of the assailant, came to Ogden yesterday afternoon and visited her husband and Page at the county jail and made a straightforward statement to Deputy Sheriff Wilson and others. She shields the young man Page in every particular, and makes the serious charge that her husband had told her on numerous occasions that he intended killing Page if he had to go to the ends of the earth to do it, that he would some day get him into a saloon and get him drunk, then lure him to some secluded spot and choke him to death. She says her husband was a very jealous man and was without cause, that she was friendly with Page, but only because he had kept company with her adopted daughter Elizabeth Page. She also expressed a willingness to go on the witness stand and testify against her husband, but as the law prevents a wife from going on the witness stand to testify against her husband in a criminal prosecution of this kind, her evidence cannot be used, but the officers expect to get practically the same testimony from other sources of his threats to kill Page. The woman declares her husband has been unkind to her, and that she intends getting a divorce from him.

Farse has consulted with Attorney W. D. Lessenger and expects to employ him to defend him in the case.

## O. S. L. SUED FOR DAMAGES.

Robert Wilkinson Wants \$8,380 for Injuries Received in Smashup.

Ogden, June 27.—The Oregon Short Line Railroad company has been made defendant in a damage suit, filed in the second district court by Robert Wilkinson, through his attorney, H. H. Henderson, to recover \$8,380. The complaint sets forth that on April 27, 1906, the plaintiff, while driving a milk wagon on Twenty-first street, was struck by an engine belonging to the railroad company, knocking plaintiff from his vehicle, causing serious and permanent injury, that his horse was killed, and the milk wagon demolished. The accident, plaintiff alleges, was caused by the carelessness of the railroad company in its employees moving the locomotive at a high rate of speed over the street crossing without giving any warning.

## OGDEN WITHOUT CONTAGION.

For First Time in Months City is Free From Quarantine.

Ogden, June 27.—For the first time in several months, Ogden is without a case of contagious disease, and not a quarantine flag is to be found posted within the city limits. This statement is made in a report prepared by Sanitary Inspector Albert Power, to be submitted to the city council. This speaks remarkably well for Ogden, with a population of over 25,000 people, and not one case of contagious disease. The city's sanitary department and the people generally are keeping their premises in a much cleaner condition, which has greatly helped to bring about the present healthful condition of affairs, and the people of Ogden are to be congratulated on being once more free from contagion. Mr. Power states that all through this year there has been but little contagion, and the few cases that have developed are of a mild form and few deaths have resulted.

A prominent physician also stated last evening that there is very little acute illness of any kind either in the city or county at the present time.

## DRUG STORES CLOSE SUNDAYS.

Not Worth While to Keep Open to Merely Fill Prescriptions.

Provo, Utah, June 27.—The proprietors and managers of the five drug stores met yesterday afternoon and decided to close their places of business every Sunday, and as a result the following notice is now posted on the front door of each drug store: "Closed Sunday. This store will close every Saturday night at 12 o'clock, until Monday morning at 7 o'clock."

The closing movement is the result of the enactment of an ordinance by the city council for the regulation of drug stores, which goes into effect July 1.

The ordinance makes it unlawful for anything to be sold in drug stores on Sunday except for bona fide medical purposes, and to sell liquor on Sunday except upon the prescription of a regularly licensed physician. There is no exception made for the sale of medicine, and that the business they will be able to do under the ordinance will not justify them in keeping open.
