She received the ordinances in the Temple at Nauvoo, and married Elmer Thomas Bullock, January 23d, 1846.

Was the only woman who saw the blood of the Patriarch, Hyrum Smith, after his martyrdom in Car-hage jail; and was driven from Nauvoo by the mobbers, in Sept. 1846; moved to Winter Quarters, where she lived through the winter of 1847-8; emigrated to Salt Lake Valley, where she arrived September 22, 1848.

She was set apart as first counselor to the president of the Female Relief Society of South Cottonwood ward, and officiated as a midwife successfully in said ward and other wards for ten years.

During the last three months she suffered greatly from dropsy and other complaints, and died on Wednesday, April 16, at 12:45 p. m., without one struggle, or a groan; surrounded by her husband, their children, and a few of her numerous friends; being "worn out" by her labors, aged 59 years and 26 days, and having a glorious hope of coming forth in the morning of the first resurrection, to receive her crown of reward, and eternal life with the sanctified redeemed by the Lord Jesus Christ.—COM.
