

POSTAL SCANDALS COME UP IN SENATE

"Let Us Have All the Facts and See if President Will Turn the Rascals Out," Said Gorman.

LODGE TOOK ISSUE WITH HIM.

Hoar Declared if Frauds Were as Great As Claimed, Somebody Should Be Impeached.

Washington, Dec. 5.—When the resolution for the investigation of frauds in the postoffice department came up Mr. Gorman strongly opposed the reference to a committee of the resolution. He declared that the majority should not shrink from an investigation. He said there were positive assertions that men who had unlawfully placed employees on the rolls were to escape. Mr. Gorman said fraud and corruption were admitted and communicated to the senate by the president. He said the senate was not satisfied with the investigation nor was the senate. Those who had been accused had said others higher up were as guilty as they, while they have been made scapegoats. "Let us have all the facts," said Mr. Gorman, "and see if the president will turn the rascals out."

Mr. Lodge, who made a motion to refer the resolution, stated that what Mr. Gorman said only further convinced him that the resolution should be referred. The investigation made under order of the president, he believed, had brought out all the facts. There was a mass of evidence in the department awaiting an order of the senate for printing.

Mr. Lodge said that as to the insinuations against higher officers it was well that the postmaster-general and the fourth postmaster-general had made every effort to get all the facts, and it would be well for the senate to first examine the evidence to see if the investigation had been thorough.

Mr. Nelson, who yesterday gave notice that he would move to refer, said that it would be impolitic to take the evidence out of the postoffice department and make it public. He said that such procedure would furnish the defendants with the papers in the department and give them an opportunity to make a defense. He contended that this would be improper while the cases were pending in the courts.

Mr. Tillman claimed that an attempt was being made to whitewash the frauds.

Mr. Hoar suggested that if the frauds were as great as claimed, somebody ought to be impeached and such proceedings should originate in the house.

Mr. Cullum cut short the discussion on the resolution by insisting that the Cuban bill had the right of way. The resolution went over until tomorrow, and Mr. Teller began a speech in opposition to the Cuban measure.

Epidemic of Smallpox.
Dover, Del., Dec. 8.—An epidemic of smallpox prevails in a town north of Dover. Out of a population of about 100 persons there are 25 cases of the disease. The town is quarantined.

Des Moines, Ia., Dec. 8.—The Iowa Society for Suppression of Disease and Degeneracy has prepared a bill to be introduced in the coming session, providing for a physician's certificate of examination before a marriage license can be issued.

Changes in Serbian Cabinet.
Belgrade, Servia, Dec. 8.—Finance Minister Radovanovich has resigned and has been succeeded by Dr. Pasic. This is believed to be a change in the entire cabinet. Premier Gratic, it is understood, wishes to resign on the pretext of ill health and is likely to be succeeded by Dr. Pasic.

Father Fulham Dies of Injuries.
Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 8.—Father Fulham, the priest who was injured at the Ottawa university fire on Wednesday last, died today.

Henry Lischer Dead.
Davenport, Ia., Dec. 8.—Henry Lischer, publisher of the Des Moines Register, aged 75 years, Mr. Lischer was a pioneer German newspaperman in the northwest. He was a veteran of the Mexican and Civil wars.

Gold for Europe.
New York, Dec. 8.—Goldman, Sachs & Company announced an import of gold of about \$600,000. Announcement was made here today that the Hibernia Bank and Trust company of New Orleans has engaged \$250,000 for import.

To Supervise Reform Scheme.
Constantinople, Dec. 8.—M. Zinovief, the Russian ambassador, has informed the porte that Russia and Austria have definitely decided to appoint respectively M. Demerik, the consul general of Russia at Beirut, and Herr von Muller, of the Austrian foreign office as successors to supervise the carrying out of the reform scheme of the powers for Macedonia.

Ogden & Northwestern to Build to Pacific Coast.
Ogden, Utah, Dec. 8.—H. H. Spencer, one of the directors of the Ogden & Northwestern railroad, a line 20 miles long, which runs northwest from Ogden, stated today that arrangements have been completed for the extension of the road, and that if negotiations now pending are successful the road will be pushed to Coos Bay. Steel has been ordered for 11 miles of track and more rolling stock.

HAND WRITING EXPERTS.

Several Placed on the Stand in the Keen-Nipper Case Today.

The Keen-Nipper case, in which plaintiff sues to recover \$10,000 as profits from an alleged investment in sheep, is still dragging along slowly in the federal court. This morning the cross-examination of defendant was completed, after which the defense introduced certain witnesses who gave expert testimony concerning the letters offered in evidence, the authority of part of which has been disputed.

Frank E. McGurkin was the first of such witnesses to take the stand and he was examined at length in this connection. The witness testified that the statements concerning money and partnership had been inserted by someone other than Mr. Nipper, as such statements were not in his handwriting. Mr. McGurkin admitted that the changes made in some instances very cleverly done, but when placed under the glass they became very apparent and would not stand the test of critical examination. The forgeries, he said, were made slowly and with great deliberation, whereas Mr. Nipper's writing was done rapidly and in a scrawly hand.

W. F. Adams, cashier of the National Bank of the Republic, gave similar testimony and was on the stand when court adjourned for the noon recess.

Suit for Damages.

The Tottis Ranch company has filed suit in the district court against the Central Pacific and Southern Pacific railroad companies, to recover possession of a certain tract of 40 acres of land, for the rental of the land at the rate of \$100 a month, for a period of nearly 4 years, and for \$10,000 damages for having been illegally deprived of the use of its property. The complaint alleges that the defendant companies on Jan. 20, 1890, entered upon and took possession of the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 27, township 8 S., range 10 E., of the Salt Lake meridian, containing therefrom the plaintiff company, which was the rightful owner, and has ever since held unlawful possession.

Water Case Continued.

A stipulation has been filed in the district court in the case of James Young against Daniel Lunn et al., continuing further hearing of the case until Oct. 10, 1904. In the meantime the 400 parties interested in the case will get together and endeavor to settle their difficulties out of court. The action was brought to quiet title and adjudicate the rights of the parties to the waters of Mill creek. The case has been on trial before Judge Hall for a week past, but, by the stipulation filed yesterday afternoon, a truce has been declared.
