

ENCYCLICAL ON FRANCE AND CHURCH

Seal of Official Condemnation
Formally Placed on Amended-
Separation Law by Pope.

WILL EMBITTER THE CONTEST

His Holiness Says His Chief Object is
To Comfort the Faithful in
Their Sufferings.

Paris, Jan. 11.—The eagerly awaited papal encyclical was published here this afternoon. This formally places the seal of official condemnation on the amended church and state separation law, and will constrain the bishops at their meeting to be held here Jan. 15 to range themselves against the law on all points.

The pope's unreserved condemnation of the new separation law, while expected, can only result in further embittering the contest between church and state, as the French bishops, who are about to assemble, must follow the orders of Rome, regardless of their individual ideas. The Tempé considers the encyclical as proof that the Vatican is determined to continue the war. As an illustration of what it terms the speciousness of the papal arguments, the Tempé says the statement that a priest cannot be a judicial occupant of a church is no longer true under the new law, and that the disaffection of churches, which the pope says was never admissible, was a possibility even under the concordat.

It is expected the government will soon reply to the encyclical either in the form of a communiqué or by declaration in parliament.

THE ENCYCLICAL

Rome, Jan. 11.—The Osservatore Romano, the organ of the Vatican, today published the text of an encyclical addressed by the pope to "Our venerable brothers, the cardinals, bishops and clergy and the French people." In this document the pontiff said his chief object in addressing the faithful in France was to comfort them in their sufferings, which he felt deeply. There was, however, great consolation in the fact that the Catholics of France were united. The French government's declaration of war was not only against the Christian faith, but against all spiritual ideas. The French Catholics must be prepared for all sorts of trials, but they were certain of final victory. Contrary to statements on the subject, the church did not desire a religious revolution. Involving the church in being a missionary of peace and carrying out her mission loyally, the church did not willingly expose herself to war and persecutions, as she did not desire to see her children suffering. Regarding the ecclesiastical properties, the encyclical said the pope had not abandoned them. The French government had imposed on French Catholics an organization which the church was absolutely unable to accept without imperiling her existence as a divine institution. The church could not prevent the unjust spoliation in progress. As for the proposed cultural associations, they are contrary to the ecclesiastical hierarchy given to the church by the divine founder himself. The pope condemned them in spite of the material interests involved at the hands of the government.

Besides, the law conferred on these associations attributes regarding both the exercise of worship and possession and administration of church property which appertain alone to ecclesiastical authority. Finally, the pope said, not only withdrawn from ecclesiastical jurisdiction, but are placed under civil authority.

Continuing, the pope said, "We have been accused of prejudice and inconsistency. It has been said that we refused to approve in France what we had already approved elsewhere. But this reproach is unjust and unfounded, for while the German law is condemnable on many points and was officially accepted in order to avoid greater evils, the situation is very different. The German law explicitly recognized the Catholic hierarchy, which the French does not."

"As to the annual declaration required for public worship, it did not offer the legal guaranty that the church had the right to expect. Nevertheless, to obviate worse evils, the church might have tolerated making declarations, but laying down that the clergy shall be only occupants of the churches without any legal status and without the right to perform any administrative act in the exercise of their ministry, placed them in such a vague and humiliating position that the making of declarations could not be accepted."

"It remains to examine the law recently voted by the chambers. From the point of view of church property the law is a law of spoliation and confiscation and has consummated the pillage of the church."

"Although her divine founder was born poor in a stable and died poor on the cross, and although she knows poverty from the cradle, the property she was possessed of nevertheless belonged to her and no one had the right to deprive her of it. The ownership, indisputably possible from every point of view, has been officially sanctioned by the state."

"The statement that the government disposed of the 'abandoned' property of the church is adding derision to spoliation."

"From the point of view of the exercise of religion the new law has organized anarchy. It installs a regime of uncertainty and arbitrariness. There is uncertainty as to whether the churches, which are always liable to disaffection, shall or shall not in the meanwhile be at the disposal of the clergy and faithful. In each parish the priest will be in the power of the municipality, with the consequent possibility of conflicts in all parts of the country. In addition the clergy are under an obligation to meet the heaviest expenses, while their sources of revenue are subjected to the strictest limitations. The new law aggravates the law separating church and state. We can only condemn it with precision and without ambiguity. Certain articles of the law throw new light on the real aim of our enemies. They wish to destroy the church and dechristianize France without attracting too closely the attention of the people. If their course was really popular as they pretend it is, they would pursue it openly and take all the responsibility."

"Instead of against the rising tide of popular repudiation the government attempts to throw the responsibility on the church, its victim, but the object will not succeed."

"As for us, we have done our duty as any other Roman pontiff would have done. The high office with which heaven invested us, as well as our faith in Christ, determined our lines of conduct, and we could not have acted otherwise without betraying our consciences or breaking the throne of St. Peter."

"Therefore we await earnestly the verdict of history, which must be that, with our eyes fixed unceasingly on the transcendent rights of God, we did not intend to humiliate the civil power nor combat a form of government, but only

The encyclical concludes as follows:

"In full confidence that the Virgin immaculate daughter of our Father, mother of the word, spouse of the Holy Ghost, will obtain for you from the most holy and adorable Trinity, better days, from the bottom of our heart we give you, my brothers, and to the whole people, our apostolic benediction."

JAPANESE SUBJECTS MAY NOT BECOME CITIZENS.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Naturalization authorities here say the question of whether Japanese subjects can become citizens of the United States already has been settled adversely by the circuit courts in the United States, which have declared that, not being white persons or persons of African nativity, they are not entitled to that privilege. The question, it is said, has never been taken to the supreme court of the United States. The decisions of the circuit courts in construing the law on this subject have been accepted by the naturalization officials at San Francisco.

Heretofore, either through misconception of the law or through ignorance, Japanese in some cases have been allowed to file declarations of intention to become citizens. Strict orders have been given in this matter, and an effort will be made to have this practice stopped.

IDAHO LEGISLATURE.

Several Bills Relating to Railroads Are Introduced.

Boise, Ida., Jan. 10.—Today a bill in the house was introduced by Ballantine of Canyon providing for the creation of a railroad commission. It is proposed to make a commission of three members appointed by the governor and removable by him. The term is six years. This commission shall have power to fix rates when the same are found excessive or inequitable, to prevent discrimination, to direct that cars be furnished where needed and to direct the operation of the railway companies. The latter may appeal to the courts from the decision of the commission fixing rates.

A bill by McCracken of Bingham prohibits the giving of any passes by a railway, telephone or telegraph company after Jan. 1, 1908. The inhibition includes all persons excepting ministers of the gospel and a few other classes.

A bill by Wyman of Ada makes stringent provisions against the formation and conducting of trusts, it describes what shall be designated as a trust, and provides that there shall be no combination in restraint of trade or to fix prices. Foreign corporations violating the law shall be excluded from the state, and severe penalties are provided for punishment of all offenders.

WATER FOR SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Jan. 11.—The Mokelumne river and Blue lakes project of water supply for San Francisco was offered to the supervisors by the Sierra Nevada Water and Power company for \$3,000,000. The offer includes the entire right and plan of the company. It is claimed that this system has an immediate capacity of 150,000,000 gallons per day, which can be delivered at a reasonable expense.

DEMAND INVESTIGATION OF SENATOR BAILEY.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 11.—Fourteen members of the body composing the Texas legislature signed a resolution today demanding an investigation of Senator Bailey and Atty. Gen. Davidson in connection with the readmission of the Waters-Pierce Oil company to Texas. The resolution will be debated next Monday, when it is expected both Bailey and Davidson will be present. The house set as a special order for tomorrow morning consideration of a like resolution.

Early today the house refused to consider the matter in any form, but later the special order was obtained. Senator Bailey's supporters tonight prepared a resolution which will be offered tomorrow as a substitute for the one now before the body. The substitute seeks to offer the charges made against Senator Bailey in the first resolution, stating that he has admitted all his connection with the Waters-Pierce oil case, and that he has successfully resisted the charges. The Bailey resolution suggests that the speaker appoint a committee of seven members who shall pass upon the Bailey-Waters-Pierce oil case. If they decide there is foundation for the charges, they shall so report to the legislature, which they can decide as to the charges to be preferred. Both factions are active tonight in preparing for tomorrow's contest.

SMUGGLING IN CHINESE.

Los Angeles, Jan. 11.—The smuggling of Chinese into the United States from Mexico, using Santa Ana as one of the stations, and the Pacific Electric cars as the means of distribution, is believed to have been unearthed by the arrest of five Chinamen, charged with being in the country unlawfully, and Lou Quong Shue, a well-known commission merchant of Chinatown, as an accessory.

The immigration officials say that for a full month the five Chinamen were locked in a freight car, and except for a little coarse food they carried with them they would have starved. The length of time they were in the freight car leads to the belief that they came from El Paso.

EXPERIENCE OF TWO MINERS

For Eight Days They Were in a
Starving and Freezing
Condition.

WERE SAVED BY THEIR DOG.

Had Gone to Mine to do Location
Work Where They Became
Snowbound.

Carson City, Nev., Jan. 11.—Snowed in with but one day's food and 20 miles from the nearest habitation, Chris Jepperson and Jack Reynolds, miners, spent eight days in a starving and freezing condition.

The two men went out New Year's day to do some location work on a claim owned by them in the Lone Pine mining district east of Gardnerville. They took their dog with them and one day's food, instructing the driver of a hired rig that took them to the foot of the mountain to return next day for them.

The driver returned to Gardnerville and forgot all about Jepperson and Reynolds until a day later. He went out but the men could not be found and he returned to Gardnerville. Jepperson and Reynolds walked up the mountain after leaving the team and reached the Winters mine, where there is a cabin. All day New Year's and for three days after, the snow fell so that it was impossible for the men to leave the cabin, even for fuel.

The food gave out the third day and Jepperson died a message around his dog's neck and rushed him out in the snow to die or reach Gardnerville. The dog reached Gardnerville Monday and was noticed Wednesday, a week after the men were last seen. The party started out and made its way to the Winters mine, arriving late Thursday evening. The two men were in a fainting condition from hunger and cold, and Jepperson died. Reynolds, when restoratives were given him, was in the deep sleep that precedes death. During the night he took all Thursday night to bring him to complete consciousness. He is badly emaciated and frostbitten.

A NEBRASKA INVESTIGATION.

Rep. Van Housen Wants One of Republican Senatorial Nominee.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 11.—Representative Van Housen, Fusionist, today presented a resolution asking for a legislative investigation of Norris Brown, ex-attorney general and Republican nominee for United States senator. The resolution went over until Monday under the rules. It recites arguments used by the Democrats in the last state campaign, alleging that Mr. Brown entered into an agreement with representatives of the grain trust and a printing company not to press suits brought by the state, extending against the company. In a statement issued tonight, Mr. Brown flatly denies these charges, and Chairman Rose of the state Republican committee says the move is backed by local interests.

HENEY'S BODYGUARD DEAD.

San Francisco, Jan. 11.—Oscar J. Kendall, who attended Francis J. Heney as a bodyguard during the trial of the land fraud cases in Portland, and who has been the prosecutor in the same capacity in San Francisco since Heney undertook the investigation and prosecution of alleged municipal corruption, died today after a brief illness of but three days, of cerebral meningitis. Kendall was a famous shot. His body has been sent to Portland for burial.

PERSIAN POPULACE.

Does Not Favor Costly Funeral for The Shah.

Teheran, Jan. 11.—The shah has received a telegram from Emperor Nicholas, expressing regret at the death of his father, wishing the new monarch a long and prosperous reign, and hoping that the ties of friendship uniting Russia and Persia will be still further strengthened.

The populace does not favor the deceased shah's request for burial at Kerbela, which is regarded as a second Mecca, owing to its cost, significantly declaring that he, having been extravagant in life, should not be permitted to be extravagant in death.

BARK CUT ADRIET.

San Francisco, Jan. 11.—The Merchants' Exchange has received a dispatch from Astoria stating that the tug Sampson arrived there today without the bark Big Bonanza, which she had endeavored to tow from San Francisco to Portland. Due to rough weather on Jan. 5 the bark Bonanza was cut in two and was not again seen by the Sampson.
