Judge Le Grand Young Named on Committee Selected to Probe "American" Revenue.

Therefore xeposures of the fact that vy tortionate rates are charged for some public work comes to have its justifica-tion by an inner circle and those near at hand, hoping next year to get a littl farther in. RETURNS FROM UINTAH.

State Engineer Tanner Tells of Irriga, tion Progress Made.

State Engineer Tanner has returned rom a 15 days trip through the Uintah country. He says the government has expended there in the last 18 months or two years \$600,000 in establishing and improving local irrigation systems. But new settlers are lacking in a proper under-standing of water husbandry, which they must learn before being able to conserve and make an economical use of the water for irrigation. The soil is very soluable in water, so that after water has been running in the ditches for a while the soil is apt to move, and the construction suf-fers. The agricultural prospects are very good, but owing to lack of transporta-tion facilities, the grops can not be mov-ed with that celerity and certainly like-ly to insure profitable shipment.
