The public is officially assured that the match is entirely a love affair, and, on Wilhelmina's part at least, there is no doubt that strong affection exists, but there is a disquieting story to the effect that her fiance, dazzled by ambition, sacrificed his love for an obscure German princess to become the consort of the cleverest, most dashing and most beautiful queen in Europe. Of course, there may be not a grain of truth in the story, for jealousy is a quality not unknown even to royal breasts, and there are many disappointed courts in Europe which are prone to look upon the darker aspects of the approaching

marriage of the little queen. The story of Wilhelmina's courtship is a pretty one. She met her promised husband, Duke Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, at the German court when she was visiting there with her mother. The young man was a lieutenant and was sametimes called upon to attend Queen Wilhelmina and her mother, Queen Emma, when they were in need of a military escort.

On one expedition the royal carriage met with an accident, and the young man by his promptness averted possible injury to the ladies. He showed his tact by escorting them, their accident having left them in a somewhat disheveled state, back to Potsdam by a secluded way, where they were in no danger of meeting any one,

The acquaintance thus favorably begun was kept up unknown to the Gernan emperor, who had intended that the cich little queen should marry his second son, Prince Frederick. One day, quite by chance, he discovered the state of affairs and sent young Duke Henry out of the way until Wilhelmina and her mother had left the German court. The circumstance that enlightened
