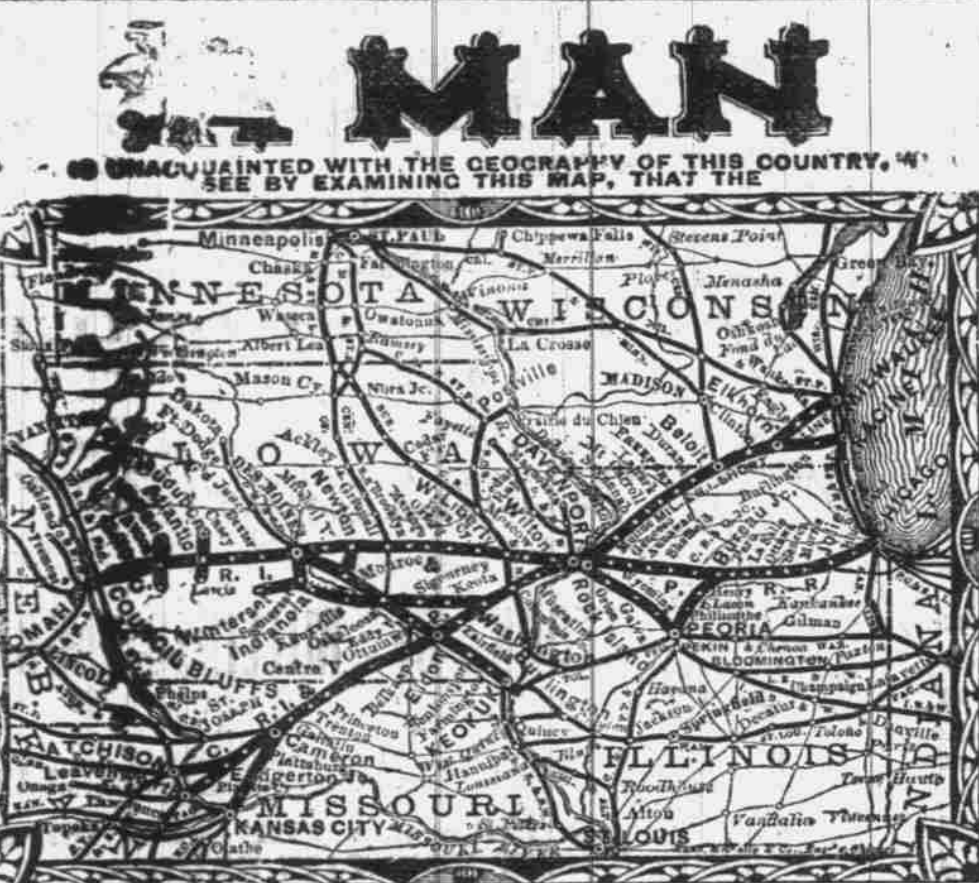

CHICAGO, 29.—Word has been

Des Moines, Iowa. His father is a

merchant of high social standing.

Young Dunkle was highly esteemed

and before he was known to be

engaged in any crime. He

left Des Moines soon after the

robbery and went to Wyoming Ter-

ritory, thence to Dakota, and

arrived with a rifle in his hand, and

had \$1,500 in his possession.

Indians.

DENVER, 29.—The Tribune's Santa

Collection at College.

RICHMOND, Va., 29.—Consider-

able excitement prevails over the

arrival of Lieutenant Governor Lewis

of Virginia, by the Dean of the

Faculty of the Richmond Medical

College. Governor Cameron re-

cently removed the Board of the

College and appointed a new Board

of which Lieutenant Governor

Lewis was President. The old

Board denied the Governor's au-

thority and insisted that they were

the legal Board under the law. To-

day the new Board met, and, after

organizing, proceeded to the College

to take possession. Upon arriving

## FOREIGN.

### Raid on Arabs.

CAIRO, 29.—It is estimated that

15 days supplies for 25,000 men were

destroyed in the fire caused by the

explosion.

The court of inquiry ordered by

the government is now sitting.

Shortly after the explosion here

yesterday, an Arab was found

throwing a can of petroleum into a

burning wagon, and another was

discovered lighting a fire under the

train, and a third was arrested for

inciting the natives to massacre.

London, 28.—The Government

has telegraphed to Cairo ordering

an investigation into the cause of

the explosion, and a prompt report

of the result.

Arrived.

The transport Carthage arrived at

on the voyage.

### International.

Paris, 29.—One of the objects of

the French mission to the Congo

was to endeavor to secure a

free international African Associa-

tion. A portion of the territory of

King Batches was ceded to France

owing to the energy of the French

missionary, M. de Brazza, who arrived

just before Stanley. France has not

yet ratified the treaty with the

Kings.

By the treaty with King Batches

France is expected to gain control of

the Congo country. King Leopold,

in a letter to M. de Lesseps, has re-

cognized this as an accomplished fact.

The French press represent Stanley

as having tried to supplant the

French and then request an im-

mediate ratification of the treaty.

Notes.

VIENNA, 29.—Advices from Pres-

burg report anti-Jewish riots there.

The anti-Jews are very numerous

and many houses occupied by Jews

are being burned. The military

has been ordered to restore order

after making forty arrests. The

military confined the prisoners in

the barracks.

The rioters declared that what

they had done was only a prelude

to what was coming. The shops were

closed and open and plundered, and

similar excesses were committed in

the neighborhood of the town of Blum-

enberg, where 80 persons were ar-
