The following was received over the wires of the Deseret Telegraph company at 10 o'clock on Saturday evening:

MOUNT PLEASANT, Sept. 7.
Today General Morrow, with a company of the Indian Police, arrived at Mount Pleasant. The words of General Morrow were firm, but kind and friendly. In regard to their returning to the reservation the Indians made no objection, but hoped the same would not occur again. They manifested the utmost confidence in the words of General Morrow, who pledged his word that they should be furnished with all necessary provisions on their way to Utah, and while they remained there. But, he said, should they be found away from their agent, he would treat them as hostile. They all agreed to return. Immediately the provisions were sent, and, if food, etc., were not provided them on their arrival they should return. The necessary provisions were sent, and the General broke up with a friendly feeling. There were present several officers of General Morrow's

command. President C. Hyde, Bishop Seely, Tucker, Olsen, Col. Allen, and Mr. Morrow left at 10 o'clock for Salt Lake where he intends to arrive Monday evening.
