REGARDING DEPOSIT OF CUSTOMS RECEIPTS.

resigned Washington, March 26 .- Under in structions recently issued by the secre-tary of the treasury, collectors of cus-toms throughout the country were di-rected to deposit their customs receipts toms throughout the country were di-rected to deposit their customs receipts in the regular depositaries. This, how-ever, did not embrace the so-called sub-treasury cities. These instructions have been today enlarged by the secre-tary so that the public deposits with na-tional bank depositaries in New York city will at once be increased about \$15,000,000 from customs receipts un-der the provisions of the act of March 4. 1907. This action is taken with a view- to facilitating the redemption of the 4 per cent bonds of 1907 and also to render available additional funds for the usual disbursements occurring on April 1. The secretary also has in-structed the treasurer of the United States to mail at once to the owners the checks for interest due April 1, 1907, on registered bonds of the 2 per cent consols of 1930, and the 4 per cent funded loan of 1907. The sub-treasury officers have been instructed to cash the checks on presentation and to cash any April coupons belonging to the honds of the voltanes.

BLOCKADE RAISED.

Twelve Hundred Passengers Due to Arrive From Coast Today.

San Francisco, March 26.—The seals in Bering sea are to be amply protected this year. Every revenue cutter on this coast has been ordered to the northern sea preserves.
