Editors Deseret News:

In answer to many questions about this place I will give a brief description of this country, hoping it will prove interesting and instructive to the many readers of your valuable paper.

This place is eight miles northwest of Franklin. There is a larger tract of good farming land here than there is in any other place in the Rocky Mountains, there being at least 20,000 acres that is all good land, and could all be fenced in one field if it were wise to do so, and there is water enough to water the whole country, but it will take about \$15,000 of good labor to bring the water on the land, but we are going right after it, and those having claims to land here had better hurry and work out their water claim, for we are forming clubs now, and those clubs will hold the water, and those who do not perform their part will have to purchase of those clubs.

This is a very desirable location. The U. & N. R. R. runs through the centre of the land and the whole country is covered with blue grass not of Kentucky, but of Southern Idaho. Of course we expect the good and far-seeing legislators of Idaho to give us a handsome appropriation at their first sitting. They can see very easily that in one year's tax after the water is out will pay them back, not speaking of the amount of tax annually.

We have at this date 65 families, and have Brother N. Porter as our worthy Bishop. We have some good times, being visited by Brother Card, superintendent of the Logan Temple and counselor to the presidency of the Stake. He was accompanied by Brothers Hatch, Herse and another brother from Clarkston. All gave us good advice and counsel which we received with gratitude and pleasure.

We have an occasional visit from Professor Nash, of Franklin, which place is greatly blessed by having such a man, for he very near makes a choir himself.

MOUNT PLEASANT,

Editors Deseret News:

Elder C. H. Wheelock and myself were called upon to visit some of the stakes in the Manti Temple district, and left home on the 21st of July to commence our first operations at Cove Fort, to receive some beef stock on the 24th. On our way we had to get hands to drive them to Manti. We had a letter from Prest. A. K. Thurber to call for hands at Joseph, but as we were passing through Elsinore on the 23d, we were kindly invited by Bishop Silvester and a number of the brethren to spend the 24th with them.

On the 24th the people of Elsinore assembled at the school-house at 9 o'clock a.m. Elder C. H. Wheelock being an old veteran in the cause of Zion, the people were anxious to have him occupy the time in relating some of the incidents which were the causes why we came to these valleys.

He related many thrilling incidents of the drivings, burnings and heart rending scenes, the Saints had to endure until the pioneers landed in Salt Lake Valley, the place God had held in reserve for his people.

After the meeting a public dinner was prepared, tables set, and all men, women and children were invited to participate; the day's entertainment concluded with a public dance.

At 5 o'clock p.m. we started in company with Bishop Silvester to Joseph, Bishop Murdoch volunteered to accompany us to the Cove and assist in driving the stock. At 10 o'clock p.m. we again started on our journey and camped at the Narrows in Clear Creek Canyon at 1 o'clock a.m. At 5 o'clock we broke camp and went to the Cove Fort and took breakfast with our old friend Arza Hinkley. Our business being done we proceeded on to Beaver and held meeting in the evening, and on Monday evening met with the Y. L. and Y. M. M. I. A.

On Tuesday went to Parowan, meeting in evening and also on Wednesday. Thursday returned to

Beaver visiting all the settlements we could, and feel pleased to report we were kindly received, and a liberal spirit manifested everywhere, the Saints showing their faith by their works. Presidents Shepherd and Ashworth, of Beaver, and in fact all the bishops and officers where we visited gave us all the assistance in their power to accomplish our mission.

The crops so far as we could see look very promising.
