LOCAL BRIEFS.

Confederate Veteran Here—Colonel John D. Paine of New Orleans is at the Cullen hotel to remain during the C. A. R. encampment. He was a Confederate during the Civil war.

Lester Freed Recovering—Lester D. Lester, freed from his hospital operation, so that he was removed yesterday to his home on East Second South street for complete convalescence.

Laborer Loses Arm and Leg—Seth Carlson, an employee of the Utah Construction company, suffered the amputation of his right arm and leg Saturday night, on account of a recent accident while at work.

Vesper Service in Park—Rev. C. C. McIntyre of the Westminster (second) Presbyterian church held well attended Vesper services last evening at Liberty park, following the band concert. He was gratified by the interest manifested.

Hyslop Welcomed—Rev. John W. Hyslop of Aberdeen, S. D., officiated at St. Paul's Episcopal church yesterday. He was formerly a resident of this city and was welcomed by many friends. Hyslop will remain in charge of the parish during the month.

Druggists Coming—The American Pharmaceutical association will hold its annual convention at Los Angeles on the 14th inst., and a special train with 150 delegates from the east will be in Salt Lake on the 14th, to stop over en route. Members of the Utah association will be present to extend the glad hand. Half a dozen Utah druggists expect to attend the convention.

Cadets on Equal Footing—Preparations are well under way for the High school cadets' trip to the Seattle fair and within a short time the details will be worked out. It has been suggested that parents give the boys only \$6 each so there will be no rivalry among them because one might have more than another. Each cadet is expected to turn over \$5 to the committee in charge to be given to him during the stay at the fair. Military conditions will prevail while on the trip.

Funeral of John Sandberg—Many relatives and friends gathered at the Twenty-third ward meetinghouse at noon Sunday to pay their respects to the memory of the late John C. Sandberg. The services were conducted by Bishop George R. Jones and A. W. Carlson, intimate friends of the family. Prayer was offered by P. S. Fernstrom and the speakers were: P. A. Anderson, W. N. Williams, John W. Taylor and A. W. Carlson. A large number of friends followed the remains to the city cemetery where interment took place.

Plumbers Still Out—The plumbers' strike is still on the boards as far as the journeymen are concerned. The master plumbers, however, do not seem to be feeling the effects of "the strike" very much, as non union men are being brought in so rapidly that the regular work is going on. The strikers demanded a raise to \$6 per day, which the bosses considered unconscionable. The union men were retained as contractors had been taken on a scale of \$5.20. So the plumbers walked out, and new men from the strike were due to professional agitators; the men, if left alone to themselves, would not have struck.

WILL NEED MORE MONEY.
City Appropriation of \$300 Not Enough to Clean Sewer.

Two shifts of men are busy on the west side cleaning out the intersecting sewer, which is blocked up with sand and gravel at the intersections of First South, Fourth South and Eighth South streets. The city council appropriated \$300 for the work about three months ago, but this amount has been exhausted, and a considerable amount will yet be required before the work is completed. The trouble is said to be due to lack of bottoms for the waterways recently installed at the three intersections, sand, gravel and other debris thus being permitted to wash into the sewer, causing the stoppage.

TOURISTS ATTEND SPECIAL SERVICE

Tabernacle is Thronged With Strangers Who Listen to Address by Elder Thomas.

ORGAN RECITAL FOLLOWS.

Big Auditorium Splendidly Decorated in Anticipation of the G. A. R. Encampment.

Probably not less than 2,500 persons attended the meeting held in the tabernacle yesterday afternoon, the occasion being a special service for tourists, by direction of the First Presidency of the Church. The majority of those present were strangers in the city, being a portion of the unusually large number that visited the tabernacle grounds during the day.

The interior of the great auditorium never looked more beautiful, with its canopy of red, white and blue, the first two colors in wide stripes, and the center of blue. That the visitors were deeply impressed was evidenced throughout the service by reverent though silent admiration, and by exclamations of wonder and delight when the services were over.

A short discourse, explanatory of the faith and doctrines of the Latter-day Saints was delivered by Elder Mathias Thomas, and an interesting organ recital was given by Prof. J. J. McClellan.

ELDER THOMAS' ADDRESS.
Elder Thomas said in part: It was not an occasion for an extended theological discussion, but to give briefly a resume of the doctrines of Mormonism. The Latter-day Saints believe to be the mission and duty to preach the gospel of Christ, but do not hold themselves as being better than other people. The truth must be spread among all people. Salvation comes by the gospel of the Lord. Obedience to the gospel will make men and women better in every way. It will make them more humble, prayerful and Christ-like.

Mormonism embraces all truth, and its adherents are so sincere that they would die for its principles. Christ is verily the Son of God and there is no other name whereby men can be saved. Salvation comes by obedience to God's commandments—faith, repentance, baptism and the laying on of hands. The teachings of Jesus are fraught with great truth, and of them are essential. There is no other rule by which salvation can come.

Existence had actually in a pre-existent state before men had being in the flesh.
Dark ages followed the regime of the primitive Christian church, and continued until the time when when government was formed—the great and glorious American government—in which religious liberty found full way, when the gospel was restored in its perfection.

Mormonism means the redemption of the world, either by individual or vicarious obedience to divine law, whereby the soul may be elevated to the standard of Deity. The canon of scripture is not final, neither will be until the souls of God's children are redeemed.
