

Richmond, 5.—Late returns indicate that the democrats have carried the State by 8,000 or 10,000 majority.

WISCONSIN.

MILWAUKEE, 5.—The State Democratic Central Committee concede 7,000 to 8,000 republican on the basis of returns so far received. The Republican Central Committee claim about 10,000 majority.

WEST VIRGINIA.

WHEELING, 5.—Eleven counties out of 52 give net republican gains of 1,600 over the October vote. A gain of 700 more in the remaining counties would give the State one-half, three votes, to Blaine, and one-half to Butler.

NEW YORK.

ALBANY, 5.—The latest figures received by Governor Cleveland give a democratic majority in the State of 2,766.

New York, 5.—Senator Gorman, chairman of the National Democratic executive committee, has sent the following dispatch to the chairman of the State committee of Indiana: "The vote in nearly every precinct in the State of New York, as announced in the polling places when counted, has been received and shows a small but safe majority for Cleveland and Hendricks. Exact figures for the State will be given as soon as the returns are complete. There will be no counting out this time!"

Albany, 5.—The latest semi-official returns show a democratic majority in the State of 3,220. It is not believed in democratic circles here that this will vary more than 300.

New York, 5.—The Tribune says: We still believe Blaine and Logan are elected. Several states are in doubt, and likely to remain so for several days, but the republicans seem to have stronger probabilities in their favor. The Republican State committee claim a handsome plurality in New York, and reports from counties continue to justify its confidence. Our own returns also give the State to Blaine by a considerable plurality, and we do not believe it can be taken away without fraud, or that fraud can go undetected. It will probably be several days before the exact result in the Southern States can be known. Meanwhile, if Indiana continues the promise of a slender, but satisfactory republican plurality, the supporters of Mr. Blaine need not feel that they are in the least at the mercy of such frauds as the democratic officials in New York are planning to perpetrate. But we expect the utmost watchfulness, and stern dealing with men caught tampering with the record returns.

New York, 5.—The Sun in its second edition concedes the election of Cleveland by the vote of New York State, having received further confirmation of its previous figures, putting Cleveland's plurality at 1,643.

AUGUSTA, Me., 5.—Blaine was up most of the night receiving election returns, and is sleeping late this morning. Dispatches received up to 1 p.m., confirm the earlier ones as to the republican victory in New York, but give lower figures. Florida and Virginia are reported as claimed by the republicans, the latter very positively by Mahone and others.

New York, 5.—At the headquarters of the National Republican Committee the members of the executive committee were in an unusually surly mood. Steve Elkins declined positively to say anything of the political outlook.

At the headquarters of the democratic national committee, Senator Gorman expressed the utmost confidence in the success and election of Gov. Cleveland. He sent a letter to a friend to-day in which he stated his belief, founded upon the most reliable information to be had, that his party would carry New York State by 10,000 majority, Connecticut by 2,600, and New Jersey and Indiana by working majorities.

New York, 6.—A Washington special to the Sun says: W. H. Vanderbilt made the largest contribution to the democratic committee for campaign uses of which there is any known record in the United States. He reserved this donation until a very late day, probably as an offset to some of his rivals on the other side. The wealthy democrats in New York who have heretofore been relied upon to furnish the sinews of war have been very sparing of their money this year, with few exceptions.

New York, 5.—The scenes in the street this afternoon are intensely exciting. Broadway is blocked with a solid mass of humanity surrounding the different bulletin boards. In Printing House Square the crowd is so dense the street cars are unable to pass. The papers all publish conflicting bulletins. Democratic sheets continue to state that Cleveland is undoubtedly elected, with Connecticut and Indiana, New Jersey and New York returns all in his favor. The republican papers are more cautious in tone, but claim Blaine's election. Business in all parts of the city seems to have been temporarily suspended, pending definite news of the result.

INDIANAPOLIS, 5.—Hendricks has been in receipt of telegrams from various sources all day, but nothing from the National Democratic Committee since morning. He answered a telegram from Joseph Pulitzer, of the New York World, who asked his opinion of the result and the reasons that, in his belief, led to it, and attached an inquiry as to how New York had gone. In response Mr. Pulitzer wired that New York had given Cleveland and Hendricks a small plurality, which might be increased. Anyhow, the State was safe for the democratic electors.

The following telegram from the Young Men's Independent Committee of New York, gave Hendricks considerable personal gratification, but "it was not satisfying as the actual facts."

"Believing that the war issues are settled, the independent republicans of New York have given you the State and voted in favor of administrative reform."

This evening an Associated Press reporter called upon the Governor and was accorded a brief interview. "I firmly believe that Indiana has gone democratic by a decisive majority, and am inclined to extend my estimate of last night from 5,000 to 8,000. As to New York State, of course I cannot be so certain. If the Associated Press figures are reliable, they settle New York State against Cleveland. The division in the democratic vote there between Cleveland and Butler was due to the employment of the latter to work in the interest of Blaine. There is no doubt that Butler was working for republicans success."

Farther Point, 5.—A fearful snow and wind storm from the east has been raging since midnight all along the coast. The wind averages 70 miles an hour. The sea is tremendous, and has crossed highways and inundated the fields of all the parishes along the coast. Here, the lighthouse and telegraph office are completely surrounded by raging waves. The roads are all undetermined; the watch-house, etc., here and several buildings near here, are carried away. Great numbers of people vacated their buildings at Ramouski and much uneasiness is felt for tonight's tide. If the storm does not go down, the Intercolonial railway track and roadway will be washed away between Ramouski and Bic. No lives lost so far as known.

SAN FRANCISCO, 6.—Although the election returns are still incomplete, yet they are sufficiently full to show the State has gone republican. The most conservative now estimate Blaine's majority at two thousand in this city and six thousand in the interior, giving him a full majority of eight thousand. But the republican victory goes further. They seem, according to the latest returns, to have wrested six Congressmen from their opponents, and what is equally important have elected a sufficient number of legislators to give them a majority on joint ballot, thus giving the State another U. S. Senator. The gains on many local tickets have been large. The State has literally jumped from democracy into republicanism. Protection has been the cause. Oregon gives Blaine a majority of fifteen hundred and republicans claim Nevada by one thousand.

WALL STREET, 6.—There is great depression in the stock market this morning: Union Pacific was particularly heavy, and broke from 52 1/4 to 48 in a few minutes; Missouri Pacific dropped from 92 1/4 to 90 1/4, Lackawanna from 102 1/4 to 100 1/4 and Northern Pacific preferred, from 43 to 41. Later—Union Pacific rallied to 49 1/4.

New York, 6.—Rockland County officials vote gives Cleveland 3,697, Blaine 2,593.

One thousand seven hundred and eighty-two election districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 391,809, Cleveland 334,658, Butler 10,567, St. John 20,118, net democratic gain 14,119.

Troy, N. Y., 6.—The official vote of Rensselaer county gives Blaine 13,759, Cleveland 13,414, Butler 707, St. John 416.

One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 403,621, Cleveland 345,028, Butler 10,839, St. John 20,710, net democratic gain 15,073.

New York, 6.—Eighteen hundred and twenty-seven election districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 398,612; Cleveland, 340,985; Butler, 10,729; St. John, 20,371; net democratic gain of 14,845.

The Graphic says: All doubt is removed. New York is for Cleveland, and the news from all quarters indicate the republicans have suffered a Waterloo defeat.

St. Louis, 6.—No complete returns from any county in Arkansas, not even Pulaski. There is no attention paid to anything in that State but New York and Indiana. Returns as to Kansas show she will go largely democratic.

The Evening Post claims this State beyond a doubt.

CHICAGO, 6.—Eb. Henderson, chairman of the Indiana Democratic State Central Committee telegraphs at noon: "Indiana has surely gone for Cleveland."

Cleveland's majority in New York City is 43,233 and Kings County (Brooklyn) 15,576.

New York, 6.—The Times says: "Neck and Neck" claims New York for Cleveland and that the Representatives are perfecting a plan to steal Indiana and that Michigan is yet in doubt. The

Chicago Herald says: Result hangs on New York, with indications favoring Cleveland. That Indiana is doubtful, but claimed by both sides.

The returns, so far received, from New York, with 57 election districts to hear from, give Blaine 552,849, Cleveland 552,234. Republican plurality 615. This includes the city and Brooklyn, and every county in the State and corrections of the figures heretofore received. The corrections are made up on complete official returns from the various counties, so far as received.

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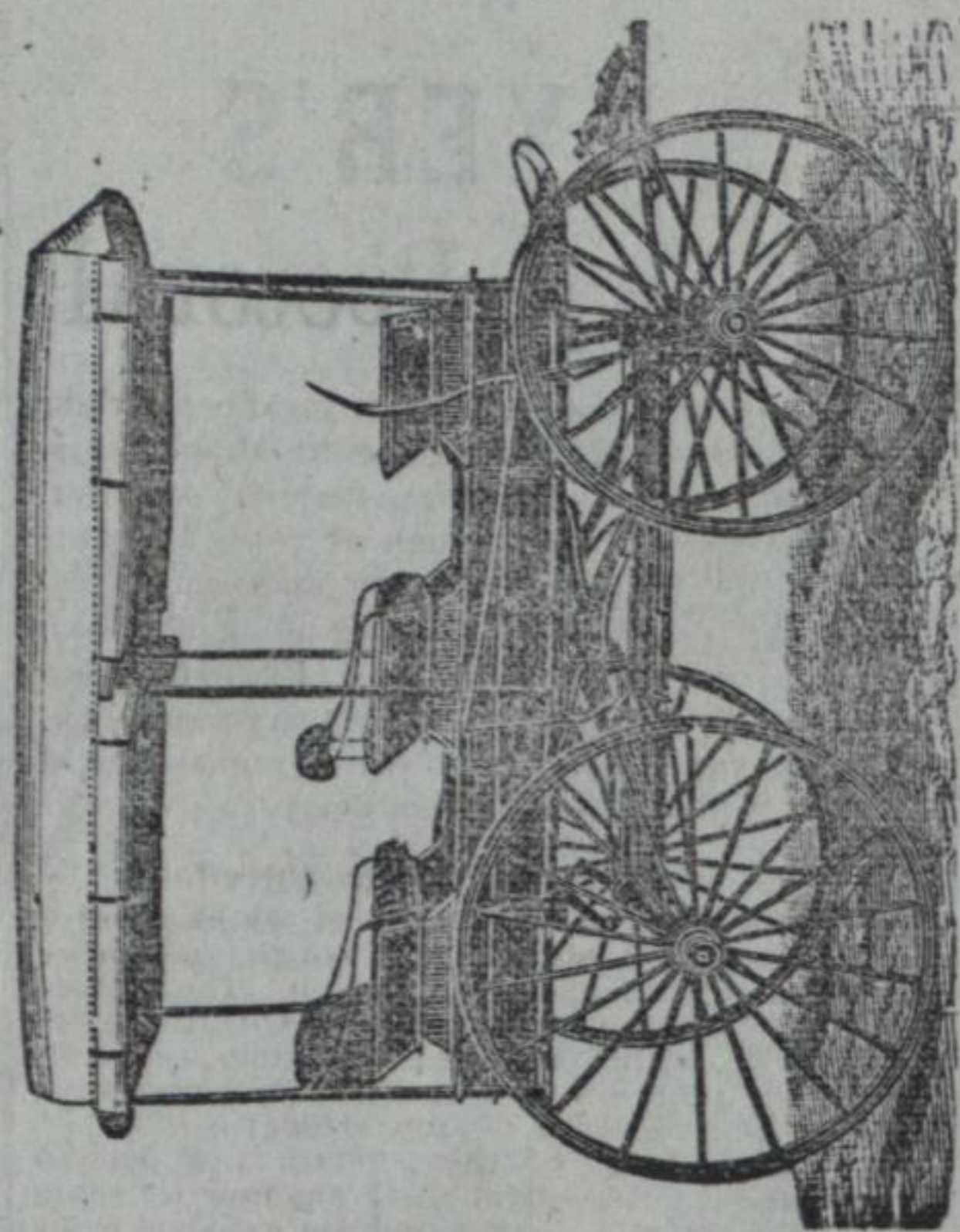
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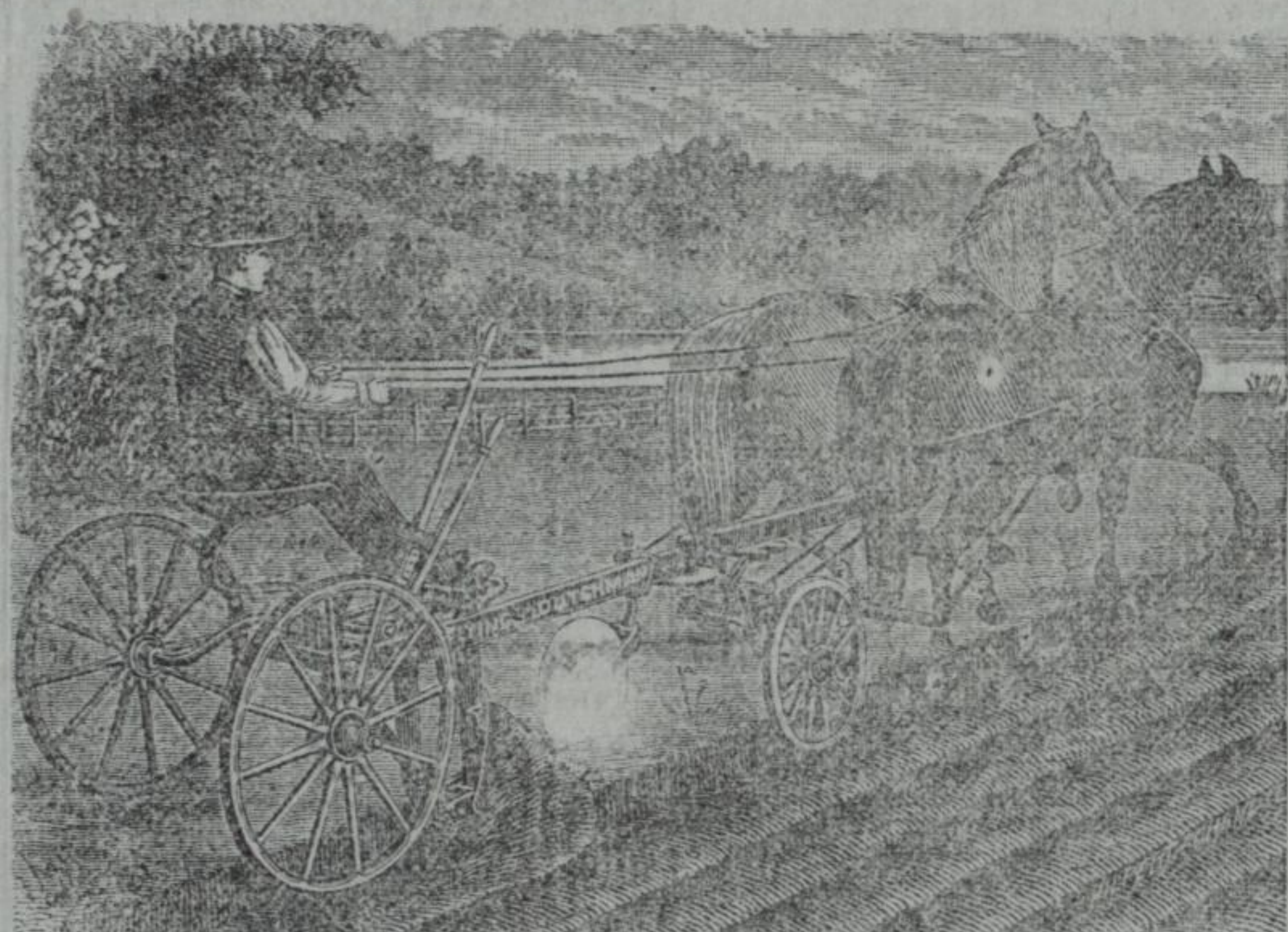
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
