

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—"The Lancashire Lass," a new sensational drama, attracted a good house yesterday. We were surprised not to see a much larger house, after all the clamorous cries for sensational pieces, and considering the fact that only dramas of a heavy calibre were presented for the last three weeks with the exception of "Playing with Fire." We will reserve our opinion, as regards the play itself, for another occasion. The acting throughout was good. Mr. McCullough's "Party by the name of Johnson" is an interesting party capably performed, but we are sorry that there is not enough of this party. Mr. Waldron acted the villain Redburn true to life. Mr. Graham, who was almost the centre of attraction as Spotty, surpassed himself yesterday evening. Miss Adams did all she could with "The Lancashire Lass." Mr. P. Margott's created great merriment by his laughable personation of the old bachelor Jelliek, who turns out to be a very soft-hearted jester. By the way, we do not see why Francis Train should make such a fuss about the horrors of an English jail, when everybody can walk in at midnight untried, as Redburn did in this play. Mr. Lindsay was excellent as Danville, and Miss Colebrook did exceedingly well as Kate Garston. Mr. McKenzie played with great spirit the character of Ned Clayton. The rest of the characters were creditably rendered.

"The Lancashire Lass" will be presented again this evening and in a Matinee Saturday afternoon for families and children. Those that are fond of thrilling situations, humor, wit and grand dramatic effects should go and see "The Lancashire Lass." The steamboat scene is a very attractive scene and alone worth the price of admission.

"Rob Roy" is now in active preparation and will shortly be produced.

**BRAIN FEVER.**—The Denver News has heard of a man, lately arrived in that city, who was possessed of the idea that a mob was seeking him to hang him. He was said to be just recovering from brain fever. The News thinks he has probably heard of the killing, one way and another, of four men, on account of one street robbery, and it has given him a relapse and it thinks it might well give a perfectly sound, healthy man the brain fever to find himself set down in a community where such things could happen and not one voice be raised in denunciation.

**NOT YET HEARD FROM.**—The young man, George Marchbanks, afflicted with fits, and partially imbecile, who strayed from his father's house in the 12th Ward, on Monday last, has not yet been discovered. The last known of him, is that he went into a house in the 11th Ward on Monday evening, which he left after having sat awhile and warmed himself. His parents are filled with the deepest anxiety on his account, fearing that, having lost his way, he may have sat down and been frozen to death, or have come to some other untimely death. He is eighteen years of age and about five feet four inches high. If any person in the city or country have seen or heard anything of him, or have him in safe keeping and will take him to the City Hall, or send tidings of him there or to this office, they will be a very great kindness to his sorrowing parents.

**THE WEATHER.**—The splendid weather of the past three or four days has gone from our gaze, and to-day the atmosphere is overcast with heavy clouds, and there is every indication of a coming storm.

**PROBATE COURT.**—Yesterday Thomas Parsons was convicted of larceny and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs, and to confinement in the Penitentiary for six months.

**CAUGHT HIM.**—Just before going to press we received intelligence of the capture of the murderer of Swett. He was captured yesterday by O. P. Rockwell and Henry Heath. A telegram to that effect has been received in this city from them at Rush Valley Station. No particulars are given.

**ON HIS TRACK.**—The murderer of Swett was seen early on Wednesday morning, near the West Mountains, north of the road leading to Cedar Fort, by a teamster from American Fork; but as the latter was unarmored he made no attempt to arrest him. By some means, however, he conveyed the intelligence of the young desperado's whereabouts to Lehi, when two men were sent in pursuit.

**MONTANA LEGISLATURE.**—A friend in Virginia, Montana Territory, has sent us some items in relation to the Montana Legislature, also a copy of acting Governor Tuff's Message, published in the Democrat of the 12th instant. The legislative body consists entirely of Democrats except two of the members of the House, who are Republicans. The Legislature convened on the 8th instant, and their proceedings, up to the date of our correspondent's letter, had been characterized by the utmost harmony. The Speaker of the House is the Hon. Mayhew, of Deer Lodge County.

Among the leading points in the acting Governor's Message are recommendations to repeal the law which provides for the payment of the members of the Legislature from the Territory. The Governor proposes to revise the school law, to incorporate a university, to take the steps necessary to secure the early completion of a penitentiary, to memorialize Congress for a Northern Pacific Railroad, and a branch railroad connecting Montana Territory with the U. P. R. The Governor thinks that the progress made in the Territory during the last four years is very encouraging and concludes his Message by exhorting the Legislature to put away party spirit and local jealousies, and with placable temper and pure patriotism to unite their efforts and energies for the prosperity of the coming commonwealth of Montana.

**A DEAD HORSE.**—There were many inquiries this morning about the owner of a horse, which was left dead in the middle of the street near the Theatre last night; Captain Burt and the police would like to see him. This conduct is most offensive, or soon would be if the weather were warm to the nostrils of the passer by. A man who has no more regard for a faithful servant than to leave him dead in the public street, is unworthy to own a horse; if he had a poor relative die on his hands, we should expect if he could do so without being discovered—to hear of his leaving the corpse in the street for the city authorities to bury.

It is simply disgraceful the manner in which some people dispose of the animals that die in their possession. They seem to think that if they haul them away from their premises they have done all that is necessary. It is not unfrequently the case that travelers on the State Road in the summer have to hold their nostrils for hundreds of yards to avoid inhaling the effluvia
