AMERICAN.  
SATURDAY'S NEWS FROM CIN-  
CINNATI.

Tilden and Seymour both Reported  
as Declining.

CINCINNATI, 19.—There have  
been many arrivals to-day and to-  
night of delegates and other New  
paper men to the number of 300  
have registered at the local commit-  
tee headquarters, and still there are  
more coming. The Tennessean and  
Texas delegations arrived to-night.

The Thurman Club of Columbus,  
200 strong, came in to-night, and  
were escorted from the depot by the  
Democratic Club of this city. The  
first detachment of the Tammany  
Hall Club arrived near midnight  
and took quarters at the Barratt  
House, where they have established  
their headquarters. The hotels are  
thronged with busy talkers to-night.

The chief topic of conversation is  
Seymour's declining to be a candi-  
date. It is conceded by many now  
that his candidacy appears to be  
out of the question, but that he  
could have been nominated by ac-  
clamation. It is argued strongly by  
the friends of western candidates  
that the inevitable result of Sey-  
mour's withdrawal is to compel the  
Democratic Club of this city, who  
on the other hand, what is the position  
of Tilden, is the absorbing question.

The streets are full of rumors, as  
the newspapers have been for a day  
or two, to the effect that Tilden  
prepared a letter withdrawing his  
name. It has been placed in the  
keeping of several gentlemen,  
all of whom have denied its posses-  
sion. Judge Hoadley, of this city,  
who is known to be a warm friend  
of Tilden, says that no such letter  
is in circulation to his knowledge.

The latest rumor in circulation is  
that Tilden is in possession of a  
letter in the hands of C. W. Whit-  
ney, of the New York delegation.

The inference is that Tilden's  
strength is to be transferred to  
Payne, but Whitney's associates  
deny that the letter is in existence.  
Still the story stands with strong  
assurance of belief and has pretty  
thoroughly permeated the conven-  
tion. It is observed of this conven-  
tion that though there is equal  
uncertainty as to candidates, there  
is not so much bitterness as at Chi-  
cago. But as the time draws near  
may be more strictly driven, and by  
Monday the adherents of the sev-  
eral candidates may be well enough  
settled in their own minds as to  
warrant a count of the probabilities.

As it is now one week upon a  
calculation of the strength of the  
candidates. There are active work-  
ers here in the interests of Tilden,  
Thurman, Field, Payne, Jewell,  
Randall, Bayard, Hancock, Gre-  
enback and English. Mr. Greenback  
is mentioned as a possible contin-  
gency, but he is not prominently  
mentioned as a candidate in case  
Tilden declines. The national com-  
mittee to-day and decided to ar-  
range a preliminary organization  
at noon on Monday. It has been  
arranged to give each delegate five  
cents for postage, 500 to the local  
committees and 600 for ladies to the  
local committees. Mrs. Susan B.  
Anthony, Matilda Joselyn, Gage and  
Lillie Deane, of New York, and  
Spencer, of Washington, D. C.,  
Elizabeth A. Winweather, of Tenn.,  
and others of the Woman's Suffrage  
Association are here to present their  
claims for ballot to the democratic  
party. They have established head-  
quarters in one of the rooms at  
Music Hall.

The *Examiner* this morning says  
that its editor has received a personal  
dispatch from Horatio Seymour,  
and that it relates no confidence in  
printing the following extract: "I  
cannot accept the nomination. I  
am not able to do the duties of an  
office. I hope my name will not be  
presented and I have never said I  
would accept the nomination. I  
would rely upon you to set me  
right with the delegates."

Chicago.—Editorially the *Times*  
considers the action of the supreme  
court of Indiana in declaring against  
Constitutional amendments as a  
perpetration, thoroughly discredit-  
able to the judiciary of that State,  
and its special indicate such general  
indignation among republicans and  
progressives of other States as to  
likely the State will give a sweeping  
republican majority in the October  
election.

The *House and Inter-Congress* have  
special notice to-day of the  
withdrawal of Tilden in favor of  
Payne. From a source which is positively  
trustworthy and able to speak with  
a positive knowledge, it is learned  
that all the stories of Tilden's with-  
drawal are absolutely false. He ex-  
pects more than one-half the votes of  
the convention on the first ballot,  
and will either get the nomination  
or dictate the nominee.

TRUTH AND LIBERTY.

WASHINGTON, 19.—Gen. John A.  
Sutter, who discovered gold in Cali-  
fornia, died yesterday. He had been  
sick about a week with inflamma-  
tion of the kidneys. His aged  
widow resides at Lehigh, Lancaster  
county, Pa., to which place the re-  
mains will be taken for interment.

Funeral services were held over  
the remains of Gen. John A. Sutter  
to-day, at the residence of Chas.  
Mades, in this city, and they were  
then conveyed to the railroad sta-  
tion for transportation to Lehigh,  
Pennsylvania, where his aged and  
feeble widow and several grand-  
children reside. He also leaves a  
son and daughter in Acapulco, Mex-  
ico, and a son in San Francisco, Cal.

The San Francisco *Chronicle* says  
that Gen. Sutter delivered a brief  
address in which the noble, guide-  
less nature and sterling active vir-  
tues of the veteran pioneer were  
eloquently portrayed. The Con-  
gressmen were the Hon. John Kitz-  
Swiss Consul General; E. C. F.  
Hastings, of California, and the fol-  
lowing California gentlemen: Wm. C.  
Alabach, C. T. Crandall and Jas.  
S. Pierce.

For the Pole.  
The *Guards*, Captain Howgate's  
and the *Albatross*, left yesterday  
for the arctic regions. The vessel  
is British and cannot carry the  
American flag. The expedition is  
the personal enterprise of Captain  
Howgate, who will bear all expenses.

Greenback Organization.  
CHICAGO, 19.—The greenbackers  
held a meeting to-night, for the  
purpose of consolidating various green-  
back and labor parties, and forming  
organizations to support Weaver and  
Chambers. The socialists, who were  
represented in the meeting, but  
when it appeared that the platform  
of the Greenback party was to be  
disfranchisement, they withdrew  
to which all present were invited to  
subscribe their names, did not con-  
tain the earth, air and water resolu-  
tion, the socialists, notified the  
greenbackers that the greenback  
party and name its own candidate  
for President. The socialists have  
polled 15,000 votes in Chicago, and  
claim 100,000 in the country. Their  
disfranchisement of the greenback  
would greatly reduce the greenback  
vote in November.

Chicago Tour.  
The first spring meeting for the  
season was held to-day at the Chi-  
cago Jockey Club grounds to-day,  
and was very successful. The track  
was in the best possible condition  
and fully 5,000 spectators were  
present. The sport was fine, each race  
being hotly contested. The inaugural  
race, all ages, 11 miles, was won by  
Dime. Second, Head Light third,  
time 2:09.

Building Commenced.  
The *Journal* says: It was publish-  
ed a day or two ago that the republi-  
can meeting called to ratify the  
nomination at the Chicago Con-  
vention at Montevideo, was forcibly  
broken up by a democratic mob, is  
fully confirmed. Rotten eggs and  
pistols were the chief armaments  
used by these Chicago "free-  
speech" men. This opens the cam-  
paign.

New York, 19.—Richards & Co.'s  
saw, planing and flouring mill is  
burned. Loss, \$25,000.  
Philadelphia, 19.—Early to-day  
the coal of steel and tanks of Mal-  
comb Lloyds, near Point Breeze, were  
burned. Loss, \$30,000.

New Orleans, 19.—Part of the  
town of Metairie, La., including  
the Court House and Odd Fellows  
Hall, was burned Friday. Loss,  
\$100,000; insurance, \$30,000.

Baltimore, 19.—Rosedale & Co.'s  
factory, 100 N. Frederick  
Street, burned to-day; loss, \$300,000;  
insured.

Garfield's Travels.  
HARRISBURG, 19.—General Gar-  
field arrived to-day. He was met  
at the depot by a large crowd of peo-  
ple, and the scene was a grand one.  
Congressmen, Humphreys and  
Williams of Wisconsin also spoke  
in compliance with Garfield's re-  
quest from General Garfield, Sen-  
ator Cameron met him at the depot  
and accompanied him West.

Deaths.  
JEFFERSON, Ohio, 19.—On Thurs-  
day, David L. Shank, a young black-  
smith attacked two widows in their  
houses and killed one, Mrs. Lettie  
aged 64, the weapon used being a  
knife. He was driven away before  
he had time to kill the other woman.  
He feigned insanity when he was  
arrested, but it is said he was only  
drunk.
