DEATH OF CONGRESSMAN HASKELL.

At the close of last Congress the gentleman returned to his home in good health, but was subsequently seized with iliness that puzzled the physicians who waited upno him. They apparently widely differed in opinion in regard to the character of the malady. In consequence of this uncertainty the patient was treated for a variety of claim of \$620. diseases, and thus made the victim of pharmaceutical experiment. During the last Congress Mr. Haskell was one of the most bitter. uncompromising and unrelenting opponents of the people of Utah, oven exhibiting the heat of his passion by the application of the most uncalled for and opprobrious epithets.
