## **FRAGMENTS.**

The Mary Anderson company leave for the west this afternoon at 5 o'clock.

The Weibe benefit concert will be given in the Theatre to-morrow evening.

The grand jury this afternoon reported three indictments under United States laws.

The Eighth Quorum of Seventies will meet at the usual place to-morrow evening at 7:30.

The articles of association of the California Life and Accident Association were filed with Secretary Thomas to-day.

The D. & R. G. W. and Utah Central railroads give the same rates to Conference at Provo, single fare for the round trip.

Mrs. Packard, daughter of Surveyor General Dement, left for her home at Lexington, Mo., by this morning's D. & R. G. train.

Another case of diphtheria is reported from the Fifteenth Ward, on First South Street, between Seventh and Eighth West.

The roads in this region, which a short time since were almost impassable on account of the mud, are now getting quite dusty.

This clouds to-day portend another storm. It would be rather unusual for spring Conference to pass without a storm of some kind occurring.

One hundred and ninety-six passengers arrived in Ogden from the west to-day; 141 went east over the Utah Pacific, and 55 over the D. & R. G.

Harry Squires, the barber, may be found hereafter by his patrons at the old stand of Squires & Sons, first door south of the Hooper & Eldredge Block.

Several Elders writing from the Southern States complain of not having received any mail from home for upwards of a month, though letters and papers are mailed to them by their friends very frequently.

It will be convenient for those who intend going to conference to know that the Utah Central passenger train leaves Salt Lake City at 7:30 a. m., arriving in Provo at 9:35 a. m.; returning the train leaves Provo at 4:25 p. m., reaching this city at 6:40.

Residents on Fourth West Street, between First and Second South, complain of the nuisance caused by a hydrant located there, the water from which, together with the slope from two adjacent houses, is allowed to run out across the sidewalk and flood the street. It ought to be abated.

The Stake Tabernacle, at Provo, has been temporarily fitted up by the Saints of that city for the holding of the coming Conference, the arrangements for which were completed last evening, with the exception of some evergreen decorations. It is to be heated by means of four large stoves, and will be quite comfortable.

It is rumored that the Knights of Labor in Ogden purpose holding a meeting to consider the feasibility of expunging "Mormons" from their organization. While we have nothing to say against the Knights of Labor as a body, we think it will be a good thing for the "Mormons" should such a proceeding be pursued.—Ogden Herald.

The Home Dramatic Company, of Provo, are exhibiting themselves in the dramatic line for Conference visitors, and "The Lonely Man of the Ocean," "The Moral Brand," "Orange Blossoms" and "The Colleen Bawn" are announced for presentation at Brigham, on Saturday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Among the death notices we are pained to record the demise of Marcella Elizabeth, daughter of Andrew W. Cooley, in her fourteenth year. Brother Cooley, whose term of imprisonment will expire on Wednesday next, his inability to pay the fine has kept him in custody 30 days longer than the period of sentence, was allowed to come out to see his dying child, but arrived about fifteen minutes after she had ceased to breathe. The funeral services will be held at the family residence at Brigham, to-morrow. We sympathize with the bereaved in their hour of affliction.

More Thieves Sentenced.—Justice Pryor's Court is doing a good work in placing behind the bars a number of petty thieves who have infested this city. This morning John Crocker, who stole a washbasin and boiler from Father Scanlan's, at the Catholic church, yesterday, was brought to trial, and the case clearly proven. Crocker introduced as a witness in his defense, Wm. Boden, and the testimony elicited formed a chain which effectually connected Boden with the transaction. A complaint was made out and Boden was arrested and tried for petty larceny, the result of the proceedings being that both Crocker and Boden were adjudged guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$75 each. Not having the necessary funds the two men will occupy the gravel beds for 70 days. While being removed to jail Boden declared, Chicken Clarke like this "an honest man couldn't make a living in this town."
