SAN FRANCISCO, 8.—A Mexican, one

of the proprietors of the *San Pedro*, a

rancho, near Half Moon Bay, was kil-

led in a drunken brawl last eve. Val-

entina Pevernia, who informed, says

three others were stabbed in the affray.

Owing to increased expenses of op-

Four Italians have come into the city

from San Pedro, near Half Moon Bay,

to give themselves up, wishing to give

their statement of the circumstances of

the killing of one of their countrymen

last night. They state there are eight

of them in partnership on the ranch

and last night Pevernia, a ranch-

man in the town above, came there

broke into a rage, and threw himself on

one of them, when he was shoved out

of doors and he fired shots through the

window, through which he fired any-

where. The party then ran out and he fired

another shot, wounding one of them and

then seizing a pitchfork chased them,

wounding two others, when they fled.

One of the party fired a shot, killing him

at once. Others sent word that if

wanted they would come here and sur-

render themselves.

Horrible Treatment of Jews.

The *Manchester Courier* publishes the

following letter, the authenticity of which

is vouched for, dated from Bucharest Feb.

24th.

"A deputation from Cahul reached me

to-day. I am engaged preparing the

statement, and petition to the government,

on which to predicate a demand for their

protection and indemnification. The his-

tory they gave me is far more heart-rend-

ing than that of Israel. Their sufferings

were horrible. Language fails me to depict

all they have related. Cahul is a place of

some 1,000 of whom are Israelites. Sudden-

ly the latter were set upon, and for

three days beaten, wounded, plundered,

driven out of their homes, which were

battered to ruins, and forced to take refuge

in the barracks, where, instead of being

defended they were kept without food

for three days, and then sent away with

nothing but the clothes on their backs.

Heads were split open, arms

were broken, and the bodies of the

broken, bodies plucked out by the roots.

One of the men from the camp, who was

battered to ruins, thus gives me this relation

(Mr. A. Gold) defended his house for

three days, his four sons standing by him. They

beat 30 rounds of ammunition. He made

his sons swear that if he fell, they would

continue to fight. Bands of 50 men
