FORT DOUGLAS TRAGEDY.

Story of Witness May Clear Smith of The Murder Charge.

The evidence produced before Coroner

flark yesterday afternoon, in the Smith-Hassett (Fort Douglas) shooting case went to clear Smith, the prisoner, of murderous intent. Private Preston of the Twenty-ninth infantry testified that he occupied the seat in the car behind Smith, who in turn sat behind Riley and Hassett. Not a word was said until the car stopped at the fort when, as the soldlers returning from town to their barracks, rose to leave the car, Riley and Hassett suddenly turned on Smith, threw him to the floor of the car and commenced to "ple his form." moment later the witness saw a re-olver in the hands of one of the men but he could not say who held the weapon when it was discharged, as all three were grabbing for it. Preston left the car anticipating a shooting bee, and in this he was not disappoint-Immediately, the brake on the car was released, and the car started for town of its own motion. Witness hurried on board the car again and set the brake. Then he went inside where he three men were still struggling, and managed to secure the gun from Smith. The weapon was turned over to the conductor, who in turn turned

over to Sergeant Hare of the guard. Sergeant Lockhart, the sentry, testied that he found Riley and Hassett lying across the south rail of the track and Smith lying over the corresponding north rail. The hearing will be con-

Owing to the late tragedy at Fort Douglas, the commanding officer has a sentry board every car now leaving he post, and every soldier on board has to show his pass. Such as have none are sent back to their barracks after their names are taken, and the offenders are punished.

Oscar W. Moyle Will Likely Continue As President, and Judge Henderson as Vice Fresident

Tuesday night whatever shaking up is to occur in the board of education as the result of the recent election, will be made manifest. Ordinarily, after an election & considerable change occurs, but this time the re-election of so many old members precludes such a possibility.

For the office of president, the only candidate now appearing is O. W. Moyle, who is suggested for re-election. He has been a member of the board for eight years, and has only been president one year out of that time. It is not considered probaof that time. It is not considered probable that opposition to him will develop. Next to Mr. Moyle, the senior member of board, is Arnoid G. Gianque, of the Second precinet, who is also a presible candidate for the orice of president.

In the clerical force there will be no change, Clork Judd continues in office for another year, and it is understood that he has the cordial support of the board, who regard his services as entirely efficient. Miss Arna Liggan, stenographer, is thought to have the support of the new members as well as the old, and will continue in the position which she has occupied heretofore.
