The Cultornia Safe . Deposit & Trust company was regarded as one of the strong financial institutions of the city. Its manager is J. Dalzell Brown The bank is understood to he the financial agent on the coast for the Western Pacific railway now being built.

As soon as the notice was posted a curlous crowd gathered in front of the bank building at the cener of California and Monigourary streads. The doors were closed, however, and no one was admitted. The closing of the bank was caus-ed by heavy withdrawals of depails during the mail for door. The head

The suspended bank was placed in a very pocular position in its rela-tions with the other banks in this city and its suspension is attributed solely to that fact—not to any em-barrassment or drain upon its re-surces, nowith-tanding that there had been unusmant of avery withdrawalls of coin by depositors during the fore-reen of today.

The bank is per-tently solvent and is making arrange-ments in the east for assistance, which it confidently expects to abtain. The bank will unduched by open its doors within a few days.
