Three political chairmen and City Recorder J. B. Moreton are busy today preparing for tomorrow's election. Effort is now concentrated on getting them recorded tomorrow and then to get the ballot work within the committees and not the streamers of fiery spellbinders that count. Each chairman today expressed to the "News" his confidence in the perfection of his organization, he has succeeded in getting ready for tomorrow and it is declared by each that the full party vote will be got to the polls.

**NO DEMONSTRATIONS.**
