

FIFTIETH CONGRESS. Washington, May 4.—Private business having been dispensed with the House went into committee of the whole on the tariff bill. Caswell (Wisconsin) criticised the

Caswell (Wisconsin) criticised the method of tariff reduction proposed by the committee on wars and means. He declared it did not provide for any substantial decrease upon the articles of general consumption. The committees should have provided, he continued, for an entire removal of the duty on Sugar. That course would take \$1 tax from the food of every man, woman and child. Such relief would extend to every family, rich and poor. He would give a reasonable bounty for sugar produced in the United States, but he would no longer continue the great tax en the mouths of sixty million people under a guise for tax for revenue. MacDonald spoke in opposition

MacDonald spoke in opposition to the protective system and explated upon the injuries resulting to the people by hoarding up a vast surplus in the treasury. Guenther (Wisconsis) remarked that his colleague (Budd) swallowed the whole dose prepared by the democratic majority and seemed to relish it greatly, endeavoring by political sophistry to pursuade the people of his district that it was a vary palatable doctrine—a panacea for all evils, the long looked-for democratic St. Jacobs oil that would hear all evils of the body politic. [Laughter.] He was in favor of restoring the wool tariff of 1867. He was a firm believer in a tariff which not only supplied the means for the expenses of government, but at the same time built up and encouraged home manufactures, developed the inexhaustible reources of the country and gave employment to millions of our people. While he deplored the condition of the workingmen of the country of his birth, he did not feel called upon as an American to give aid to them at the expense of the laboring people of America.
