FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

From Wales.—We had a pleasant call to-day from Elder John M. Bowen, who arrived in with the company that arrived to-day. He left this city, Sept. 14th, 1890, and during his absence from home labored in Wales, mostly in the southern portion. He had the pleasure of baptizing over twenty persons, and enjoyed his mission, having had excellent health. He traveled nearly 7,000 miles on foot during his ministry. Elder Bowen resides in Herkman, this county.

The Immigrants.—The immigrants in charge of Elder George Stringfellow arrived in good condition to-day. The voyage across the Atlantic was lengthy, occupying thirteen days, the vessel being detained by headwinds and stormy weather. The journey by rail was prosperous and comparatively pleasant. Only one death occurred on the entire trip, a child about two years old, who died near Laramie. The body was encoined and brought with the company to Evanston, where the father of the deceased resides.

From Pennsylvania.—Among the missionaries who reached the city to-day, with the immigrants was Elder J. K. Ingle, who has been laboring a year in Pennsylvania, most of the time associated with Elder W. G. Broughton, who is still in that field. We have made frequent reference to Elder Ingle's labors in our columns, rendering it unnecessary to enter into details now. The two brethren named combined and baptized sixteen new members of the Church. Elder Ingle resides in Orderville, Kane County, for which place he expects to leave to-morrow.

Another Orchestra.—The following well known musicians of this city have just completed the organization of a new orchestra and a silver band for their mutual benefit: Magnus Olsen and Willard Welhe, first violin; W. Youngdale, second violin; A. Bergdane, viola; George Hedger, flute; H. Alder, cornet; H. Case, trombone; J. Olsen, violoncello; E. Wetzel, double bass, and W. Clayton, tympani.

Mr. Pedersen having the confidence and esteem of his associates, both as a talented musician and an honorable gentleman, and also an industrious worker, the members of the orchestra expect to be able to satisfy the urgent desire of their many friends for their success.

Beautiful Specimens.—We have been shown, by Brother Algood, of Nephi, a number of articles, for use and ornament combined, made by him from gypsum found in that vicinity. The specimens are beautiful and artistic in form, capable of adorning the richest dwellings. One is a watchstand, the center or receptacle of which is surrounded by exquisitely formed little pillars surmounted by an arch, with shapely points, to give the requisite finish. There are also two handsome vases, four candlesticks, two egg cups and a couple of pincushions.

The material comes as near to the appearance of genuine marble as anything we have ever seen. In fact it is largely of the nature of that material, only sufficiently soft to admit of being turned by means of a lathe, and therefore not being brittle, is susceptible of easy manipulation and transformation into the most lovely shapes. The surface has a smooth polish, and the color is a creamy white with numerous under-colored veins running through it. Articles made from this material are reasonable in price, and should Brother Algood find enough encouragement he will establish the business of manufacturing that line. We believe, judging from the specimens we have seen, that the industry would be profitable.

Brother Algood is a capable workman in this interesting line, that having been his business in England, from which country he came to Utah about a year ago. The number of articles which can be made from this excellent gypsum is practically endless, in character and variety.

SHOOTING AT KANAS.

TWO MURDERED MEN QUARRELLED AND SHOT ABOUT PROVISIONS.

A shooting affair occurred here last night between Thomas Turley, a "Liberal," and W. H. Holladay. Turley appeared to feel irritated over election matters, Holladay called him a liar, when Turley drew his pistol and fired, Holladay receiving a scalp wound, bleeding profusely. Turley ran, and Holladay fired two shots at him, missing him, when Officer Fuller, who was immediately by, stepped in, with assistance, disarmed both parties, who are to appear before Justice Broadbent this morning.

THE PIUTE COUNTY MYSTERY.

DESCRIPTION OF THE MURDERED MAN WHOSE BODY WAS FOUND IN SEVIER RIVER.

The body of an unknown man was found on Friday, the 8th inst., in the Sevier River, at the head of Circle Valley. A coroner's inquest was held. The verdict of the jury was that the man came to his death by violence.

The man was of average height, of rather dark complexion, dark hair and whiskers, very slightly grey, about 35 or 40 years of age. He had on, when found, a knitted red wool shirt, a brown canvas jumper and overalls, while cotton flannel drawers, a pair of No. 8 shoes, evidently home-made and of home-made leather scarcely any worn, and large headed moccasins around the heels. In the pockets were found a new, little, black handled pocket-knife, one blade broken short, a campaign cotton handkerchief, with likeness of Hancock and English, a pipe well wrapped with a quantity of thread, and the stem broken as if recently in a scuffle.

He had been shot in the back, just below the right shoulder blade, the ball appearing to range towards the heart. His legs and body up to his head were wound around and around with two very heavy cable chains. One of the chains measured twenty-one feet long, and had one large heavy hook at one end and a broken large grab-hook at the other end. The other chain is fifteen feet long, with one open hook and one grab-hook.

This notice is given for the purpose of calling the attention of all persons, with the hope that some one may identify the articles named above, and furnish a clue to the sheriff of Piute County, John S. Baer, at Junction, in Piute County, Utah.
