SENATE DEBATES -m3 WINDOW GLASS senator Smoot Produces Some Figures on Cost That Are Simply Startling. ULMMATE CONSUMER ROBBED

Before He Gets His Pane of Glass it is Advarced Six Hundred Per Cent. Above Wholesale Cost.

Washington, May 12 .- After a debate of several hours in the senate today on the window glass schedule of the tariff bill, Senator Aldrich asked that the paragraph be passed over.

Some other sections relating to glass manufactured articles that previously had been passed over were agreed to. had been passed over were agreed to. The senate considered sections that had been passed over until the iron ore paragraph was reached, when Senator Crawford spoke at length upon the lack of wisdom of any tariff that encour-aged the exhaustion of natural re-sources which could not readily be re-produced. Senator Paynter spoke in favor of the removal of the duty of 6 cents a pound upon leaf tobacco as a means for freeing the tobacco growers from the con-trol of the tobacco trust.

PLEA FOR TOBACCO.

Pleading for an amendment to the Pleading for an amendment to the tariff bill to permit the producer of tobacco to sell hand twist tobacco with-out the payment of a duty of 6 cents per pound, Senator Paynter of Ken-tucky today laid before the senate the history of the tobacco industry in this country. He declared that the tobacco adverting to the tobacco troubles in Kentucky, expressed the hope that the enactment of the proposed law would remove the causes which have pro-voked these troubles. Continuing, he

"The manufacturers have no right to demand, as a matter of protection to them, that the farmer should not be permitted to sell his tobacco in the ratural leaf to whomsoever he pleases. When the internal revenue laws were enacted, the government made no prom-ise to manufacturers that the farmers should not be permitted to sell their tobacco in the natural leaf to the con-sumers through the instrumentalities

of their vendors." When Senator Paynter had conclud-ed his speech. Senator Cuberson took the floor for brief comment on recent ourt decisions in litigation against the tobacco corporation instituted by the department of justice. He said that four circuit judges of the United States had expressed the opinion that this trust "was a monopoly, and existed in violation of the laws of the United

"I do not know what may be the urpose of the present attorney-gen-ral in respect to this suit," said Mr. purpose of the present attorney-gen-eral in respect to this suit," sail Mr. Senate a petition from his constituents in New Hampshire, praying that a re-duction of 10 cents a bushel be made oubt is thrown upon the course he proposes to take with reference to the enforcement of this anti-trust law.
