Jensen, Uintah Co., Sept. 7.--I have just finished a tour of the Uintah stake of Zion, in the interest of Church his-tory, and have noted with pleasure the progress made in this veritable ousis in the desert since a former visit here fourteen years ago. Vernal, which was then a small cluster of houses, has grown to a respectable business center with bank, fine mercantile houses,mod-crn school buildings, a beautiful tabec-nacle nearing completion and some paved streets. In the Uintah valley, of which Vernal is the Omtan valley, of which Vernal is the center, there are now about 7,000 people, of which the unjority are Latter-day Saints. The Uintah stake consists of seven wards, namely Vernal, Maeser (former-ly Mills). In order to reach the Uintah stake headquarters, which are only about 175 miles in a straight line southeast of Salt Lake City, the visitor must now travel by circultous route about 400 about 490 miles, 64 miles of which is by stage. Owing to a difference in train connections at Mack, it takes about 48 hours to get to Vernal from Salt Lake City, but only 40 hours (or two days and a night) to get back. But the accommodations for the traveling public are very good all along the line. The new Uintah rallway,running from

Mack, on the R. G. W. railway in Col-orado, to Dragon, in Uintah county, Utah, is a marvel of engineering and construction. The road is 54 miles long and crosses the main range of the Book long Cliff, at the Baxter pass, which has an elevation of nearly 8,000 feet above sea-At Atches, a station 28 miles out level. from Mack, the trains begin thei climb toward the summit of the moun their tain, with one mile of 5 per cent grade and thence on an uninterrupted grad of 7% per cent, five miles to the top Two thousand feet of elevation is at tained in these six miles by an engineering accomplishment that is unique in railroad enterprise, rising steadily up the face of the great mountain. There is scarcely a moment when the eye of the passenger may not rest with perfect delight and wonderment upon a gorgeous panorama of slopes below an of valleys and deserts beyond. When the Baxter pass is reached anothe panorama is unfolded on the north, as from the narrow summit the traveler sees the valley of Evacuation creek stretching out to the Grand Canyon of White river and over the old Uncom paligre reservation to Raven ridge and Blue mountains on the north; also to Rabbit mountain and the White Elver plateau on the northeast in Colorado, and over the Uintah reservation to the Uintah mountains in the northwest, 130 miles away. The northern descent from Baxter pass is not quite so sleep in grade as the southern slope; here the railway winds through alternating groves and parks to McAndrew's lake, an artificial storage reservoir, thence down to Dragon, the farwarding point for paragraphic expression for passengers, freight, express and mail to Vernal, Fort Duchesne and eth-er points in Utah and Colorado. The er points in Utah and Colorado. The stage leaves Dragon at 7 o'clock ev-ery morning. After crossing a suc-cession of hills, White river, 18 miles from Dragon, is reached. Here the scenery is grand beyond description. Vast amphitheaters, obelies towering pinnacles, all in confusion

worse confounded!"

The distance from White river bridge to Green river ferry is 32 miles. On that journey the traveler passes through "bad lands," which reach their zenith of barrenness and desolation in the so-called Dead Man's bench, also called the "Devil's Playground," where scarce-ly a spire of vegetation of any kind grows. From the new ferry on Green river at Alhandra, the distance to Ver-nal is only 14 miles.

The Uintah Railway company owns the stage line, the telephone line, the wagon road, the hotels along the line etc., and certainly deserves credit for having built a first-class road and pro-vided everything possible along its lines for the convenience and comfort of the traveling public, ANDREW JENSON.
