RAPID TRANSIT MAY SUE DEPREDATORS

Individuals and Not the City Corporation Held Responsible for Removing Track.

LAST DAY OF REGISTRATION.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—Nothing new was sprung on the public in the contest between the Ogden Rapid Transit company and certain city officials, who took up the track over the Ogden river bridge on Thursday night last, but it is rumored on the streets and apparently comes from those who know, that a big surprise will be sprung this week in the shape of a suit for damages against Ogden City.

The streetcar company does not, however, recognize Ogden City as a party to tearing up the rails, as the act was not official, and no authority was given by the city to those individuals who tore up the track. This may result in damage suits being instituted against each of the parties who engaged in the track tearing Thursday night.

The legal adviser of the company, C. C. Richards, says that Ogden City has not only not interfered with the laying of a double track, but that the city officials have inspected and approved the work.

RESIDENCE BURGLARIZED.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—The residence of Ezra Richardson at 2201 Grant avenue was entered Saturday evening by thieves, a number of the rooms ransacked and a considerable quantity of silverware and some clothing stolen. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson were away from home in the early part of the evening and upon their return a few minutes before 11 o'clock the burglary was noticed. An investigation of the place revealed the fact that silverware and clothing had been taken, but the value of the same could not be ascertained until an inventory was taken by Mr. Richardson. The thieves were shown in their method of operating, selecting a time when they knew both Mr. and Mrs. Richardson to be away from home.

A. O. U. W. APPEALS.

Hurd Fight Against Payment of Student Life Insurance.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—Attys. W. L. Martin and John E. Bagley, representing the defendant in the case of Annie C. Stander against the Ancient Order of United Workmen, filed Saturday in the office of the clerk of the district court, a motion for a new trial.

The case, which is a suit to recover damages on a life insurance policy issued by the defendant to William Stander, deceased, was recently tried in the district court before Judge B. H. Stander, who rendered a verdict for the plaintiff for the sum of \$2,000, with interest. The motion for a new trial is based on errors in law alleged to have been made at the trial of the case, to which exception was taken by P. D. Johnson, is attorney for the plaintiff.

DIVINITY OF BOOK OF MORMON.

Large Congregation Listens to Address of Elder H. H. Roberts.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—A congregation which filled the Tabernacle to its utmost capacity and crowded to the balcony, listened to the excellent discourse of Elder H. H. Roberts yesterday afternoon on the "Divinity of the Book of Mormon."

The speaker was listened to with a great degree of interest and the truths which he promulgated were driven home with telling force. He told of the discovery of the golden plates by the Prophet Joseph Smith, the translation and the testimony of the witnesses to their authenticity—evidence which, if given in a court of justice, would sway the scales of justice in their favor. ANDREW ANDERSEN DEAD.

Faithful Veteran of 70 Years Goes to His Reward.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—Andrew Andersen, 70 years of age, died last night at the family residence, 224 Monroe avenue, of asthma, from which he has suffered for some time. Surviving him are a wife and several grown up children.

The deceased was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and his country many years ago from Norway. He was a faithful church member all his life.

The funeral services were held this afternoon at the Fourth ward meeting hall. Several speakers spoke in terms of eulogy of the noble life of the deceased. Interment was in Ogden City cemetery.

A team of runaway horses, belonging to William Stewart of Warren, dashed madly up Twenty-fourth street late Saturday afternoon, and after avoiding the numerous rigs that throng that thoroughfare on market day, collided with a telegraph pole in front of the Eccles' building and were stopped. The wagon pole was broken and the horses quite badly damaged.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM INJURY.

Just before the football game was over at Glenwood Park Saturday afternoon an accident occurred in which Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Ives and Mr. and Mrs. C. V. Zinn had a narrow escape from serious injury and possible death. The four parties mentioned were in a car, as they were driving out of the grounds one of the wheels caught against the side of the gate, the horse shied quickly to one side, the occupants of the buggy were thrown out and Mr. Ives, who held to the lines, was dragged quite a distance until the horse finally broke loose from the rig. The buggy was badly broken but not one of the occupants was injured.

CITY ADVERTISING SCHEME.

J. W. Fawkes, Jr., of San Francisco, president and manager of the scenic display company, incorporated, is in Ogden with a view of establishing a display board at the corner of Twenty-fifth street and Washington avenue. The scheme is to advertise Ogden by posting up on a large board, views of this city. This board will be about 25 or 30 feet long and about four feet wide. In other western cities the same has been done and then an exchange of displays will be made and the people of this city will have the opportunity of seeing the photographs of principal points of interest, buildings, etc. of San Francisco or some other city.

WANTS TO BUILD BIG RESERVOIR.

Utah Light & Railway Company Files Petition With Weber County Board.

WOULD CHANCE COUNTY ROAD.

Matter Discussed Briefly and Continued Till Future Date—Desperate Hold-up at Large.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—A petition was presented to the county commissioners this morning by the Utah Light & Railway company, and others, asking permission to build a storage reservoir in which to store the flood waters of the Ogden river, and large enough to contain 2,000,000,000 cubic feet of water, and capable of irrigating 2,700 acres of land.

The company states in its petition that it proposes to build a dam at the main head of Ogden canyon, known as Shanghai Flat, said dam to be completed in three years. The water will be used for power and irrigation purposes, and will largely benefit the Weber and Salt Lake valleys. The flood waters will be backed from the point of the mountain east of the power reservoir to near the Ogden Valley reservoir, half a mile up the canyon. If permission is granted the company proposes to change the canyon road from a point near Potter's resort, building it on the mountain side at the crest of the dam, the grade to be not more than 2 per cent, and in continuation on the north side to the beach above the conserved water, so that the people of Eden may enter from the west side instead of the south, as is the case at the present time. For the people of Huntsville the new road will run across the top of the dam to the south side of the river and along the mountain side on the south to a point south of the city of Huntsville, the people entering from the south instead of the west, the price to be moved and the new one with a expense of petitioners. The petition is signed by W. W. Wade, commercial agent of the Utah Light & Railway company.

At this morning's meeting of the board, the matter was briefly considered and continued till a future date.

HOLDUP AT LARGE.

The Ogden police had considerable difficulty last night pursuing a highwayman. Shortly before 11 o'clock Lewis Leavitt, residing at the Twenty-seventh street, while on his way home, was stopped by a man, a Twenty-eighth and Washington avenue, and as a gun was shoved into his face, he was commanded to hand over his money. Leavitt is a young man about 19 years old, and became thoroughly frightened. Instead of doing as he was told, he turned and ran to the Twenty-eighth street, where he telephoned the police. While the officers were searching for the holdup the latter attempted to stop a buggy that was being driven by George Wright and Rector Ransom at Twenty-ninth and Washington avenue. The description of the highwayman, given by all parties corresponds, but all efforts to locate the fellow were of no avail. Early in the evening a man answering the same description was seen moving about the house occupied by Thomas Emmett, 265 Twenty-seventh street. He was frightened off by Mr. Emmett before he had an opportunity to do anything.

The four contractors who have been looking over the proposition with a view of making bids stated that they were not ready to put in bids yet and asked for an extension of time. Mr. Bamberger granted their requests and the bids will be opened Wednesday next and the contract given.

"It is against the law to distribute handbills on the sidewalk," said a friend to Ira Waldron Saturday evening. "I don't care," said he, "if I am arrested it will make good advertising for my firm." About an hour later he was taken into custody and booked at the city police station on the charge of violating the city ordinance against the distributing of handbills. Waldron intended the sidewalk of Washington avenue with thousands of small handbills. CONFERENCE OF ELDERS.

Teachers' Institute—C. O. Bahr of Salem Meets Violent Death.

Provo, Utah Co., Oct. 30.—A conference of Elders of the Utah stake was held in the tabernacle yesterday, commencing at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. President David John presiding. A committee had been appointed from the High Council to arrange a plan of work for the quorums to follow in their meetings. This plan had been approved by the High Council. The plan provided for the appointment of class teachers, and monthly meetings of the officers and class teachers to study the lessons for the ensuing month under the direction of the committee. The plan as presented by Elder Kester was unanimously adopted by the conference.

The death of C. O. Bahr of Salem last Tuesday has been reported here. Mr. Bahr was thrown some distance the previous Monday by an infuriated animal, which was being killed but which escaped during the operation, and after it was shot. It was not at first thought Mr. Bahr's injuries were serious and he suffered no great amount of pain.

Mr. Bahr has been a resident of Utah 25 years, being most of that time in Salem, where he was highly respected. He was a native of Schleswig-Holstein and about 65 years of age. A wife and several grown children survive him.

Japanese Naval Heroes Honored.

Tokio, Oct. 29.—The great Shito rises in memory of the naval officers and men who were killed during the war were held today at Aoyama cemetery. Besides the admirals, officers and sailors, hundreds of civil dignitaries were present. Admiral Togo addressed the departed spirits, eulogizing their noble deeds in battle and their gallant cooperation which resulted in the success of their lives. He humbly asked repose for the spirits whose exemplary deeds in life and eminently contributed to the victory over a powerful enemy. While reading his address Admiral Togo was seen to be stirred with strong emotion, who was in contrast with his calm demeanor while on the bridge of the Mikasa during the hottest battle. The ceremony was most impressive and calculated to leave a lasting impression on those who witnessed it. Thousands of sailors marched to the cemetery in long ranks, and the solemnity and afterword to the naval club.

HALL CAINE TALKS.

Praises Roosevelt and King Edward, Calling Kaiser Pagan.

New York, Oct. 29.—Hall Caine delivered an address to the Young Men's Bible class of the Fifth Avenue Baptist church today, at the invitation of John D. Rockefeller. Mr. Caine said that his address would in all probability be his "last word" in America in the sphere of national progress, and referring to recent disclosures of the way wealth is acquired, asked if it were not as true of the nation as of the individual that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. National progress and prosperity are often bought at the cost of every Christian principle, as was shown by the policy of the great nations in relation to the drink traffic and the settling of international disputes by war.

Mr. Caine paid a high tribute to President Roosevelt as one of the few statesmen since Mr. Gladstone who approached public affairs from the ethical standpoint, and said that the king of England was recognized throughout the United States as one of the wisest and noblest of monarchs. On the other hand, the German emperor, Mr. Caine said, while a Christian as a man, was a pagan as a sovereign and a peril to the peace of the world in his faith in the power of his sword.

Mining Engineer Murdered.

San Francisco, Oct. 29.—Passengers arriving today on the steamer City of Toledo, from the Mexican coast, bring a story of the death of John O'Dea, an American mining engineer, who was murdered some weeks ago while on his way from Hermosillo, the capital of Sonora, to the mines in the interior of the state. O'Dea was formerly identified with mining in this state. He sailed some weeks ago for Guaymas and upon reaching Hermosillo engaged a mozo, or native servant, to guide him to the mines in the interior.

When only six miles out of Hermosillo, according to the story brought by the City of Toledo, O'Dea was shot in the back by his Mexican guide. His body was found by travelers and taken to Hermosillo.
