Of the deaths 2 were from smallpox, 3 from diphtheria, 1 typhoid, 3 indigestion, 1 consumption, 2 paralysis, 2 meningitis 5 heart disease, 4 pneumonia, 2 periton itis, 2 kidney disease, 2 dropsy, 2 gun-shot wounds, 2 la grip, 2 old age, and the remainder from a variety of causes. During the month 5 cases of diphtheria were reported, 22 scarlet fever, measles 8, typhoid fever 1, smallpox 131, chickenpox 7, whooping cough 4. The births were 64 males and 45 females, total 103.
