"Not only was I the cashier for ev-ery postoffice in Porto Rico, but I was also auditor of the accounts, which I had to watch carefully, lest some employe might double up on me. I was re-quired to look out that there were no double payments, either for services or materials; that not more than one building in one town or city was rented for a postoflice, and scores of other things. Often these vouchers were not in satisfactory shape and had to be re-turned, not once, but twice or thrice. and corrected.

'I acted likewise in a third capacity in keeping accounts of the supplies sent to every office in Porto Rico. A postto every once in Porto Fico. Service to Oriental Ports.

Vienna, May 20 .- The Austrian-Hungarlan consul, A. de Brunne at Manila, in his report for 1902 paints a gloomy picture of the "Impoverishment of the Tacoma, Wash., May 20.-The Dollar Steamship company of San Francisco has arranged to maintain a regular plcture of the "Impoverishment of the Philippines, through the long cam-paign." The con-sul adds that Manila is flooded with unteamship service between Puget Sound and oriental ports. The service has been started with two steamers taking experimental cargoes.
