"BROWNIES IN TROUBLE."

Manager Friedlander Files Suit Against Fullman Co. for Damage.

A suit was filed in the United States court today by S. H. Friedlander, manager of "The Brownics in Faryland" troupe, against the Pullman company. The sult is for \$5,300 damages alleged to have been sustained by the plaintfif. because of the alleged failure of the defendant company to live up to its contract,

It is set forth in the complaint that a contract had been made between the planitifi and defendant for the latter plantifi and defendant for the fatter to furnish Pullman sleeping cats equipped with dining facilities, etc., on August 15th, 1900, for the use of the troups. It is affirmed that no cars were furnished until September 1st when one car was delivered to the plaintiff at Seattle, Washington. Af-ter boarding the car it was then hearpad the complaint reads that it learned, the complaint reads, that it was not only inadequate to accommodate the company, but that it was in very unsanitary condition, and as a consequence one of the children contrac-ted the typhoid fever, four children contracted diphtheria and five of them were tracked with scaled fever. This were attacked with scarlet fever. This caused the troupe to be quarantined at Butte, Montana, where they were at Butte, Montana, where they were compelled to remain for twenty-five days. Thus having to cancel engage-ments and to encounter much loss in the payment of doctor bills and the purchase of medicine, etc. The plain-tiff therefore, believing that his trou-bles and losses are directly attributa-bles the Bullman commany brings to the Fullman company brings suit against said company in the sum already stated.

An answer and counter claim was An answer and counter claim was filed simultaneously with the com-plaint. It is claimed by the defend-ant that inasmuch as the things al-leged to have transpired occurred out-side of the State of Utah, the court in which suit is filed has no jurisdic-tion over the matter. Its second cause of resistance it gives is that the con-tract was entered into between J. H. Friedlander & Co., and the Pullman company and not between the plain-tiff and the defendant. The answer then proceeds to deny in toto the allegatiff and the defendant. The answe then proceeds to deny in toto the allega tions respecting the condition of the car furnished.

The defendant then enters a counter claim of \$1,119.32 as balance due defendant in payment for the use of the car
