PEAR BLIGHT IN COUNTY.

Robert E. Wilson, Weber county rult tree inspector, is making an active campaign against orchard pests in reneral and pear blight in particular. The latter disease has such a start in me parts of the county that many chards, it is feared, are doomed to utter destruction. Apple and pear or-chards are attacked. This is so seri-ous a malady that the orchardists must fight it or go out of business. Before spring growth begins is the only time hen the disease can be stamped out tirely, and the work should be vigorously prosecuted at once.
