It will be remembered that, some time since, Mr. Beadle brought a suit against Mr. Toohy, before Justice Pyper, for the recovery of the amount of a note, held by the complainant against the defendant. It was the same suit in which the counsel on each side besmugged the opposing clients by dousing them unmercifully with circumstantial slops. Mr. Toohy showed that he had a claim on the other amounting to considerable over the amount sued for, and judgment was rendered in his favor for the amount of the note in question and a hundred dollars and interest and cost of suit. Mr. Beadle, gave notice of an appeal, and now Mr. Toohy claims an execution against Mr. Beadle, on the grounds that the time of taking an appeal from the Justice's to the District Court is expired, and no notice of appeal had been served upon him; also that the Justice should have sent the original papers in the suit up to the District Court, whereas only copies had been sent up. Justice Pyper refused to issue the execution on the grounds that it was not a matter of appeal, but a matter of law, and that the time of appeal had been served on Mr. Toohy; and because it had already been the custom to send copies and not the original papers up to the higher court in cases of appeal, although attorneys differed regarding the point. This point, however, is merely technical, as the originals could be had by the court whenever desired. It appears that Mr. Beadle transfigured himself into a deputy sheriff and took the notice of appeal to Judge Toohy's office and handed it to a person in the latter's employ, but whose head, the Judge says, is not bevelled according to Grant, and that, probably on account of the absence of the required amount of copperheadism, he failed to make the connection with the Judge.

A Fifty Practice.—At an early hour this morning a man deposited a load of filthy rubbish on the State Road, in the 5th Ward, directly in front of houses in that locality.
