## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Judge Ritchie has admitted Matt Wigham, formerly of Finland, now of Bingham, to citizenship.

The state board of health has authorized the town of Fountain Green to raise the quarantine against diphtheria.

Re-Senator Kearns has been notified of an increase of pension for Samuel H. W. Ritter of Logan to \$12 per month, from \$10 last.

The federal building is in receipt of a much needed new sign. It is 64x112 ft. and was "brought to the breeze" yesterday afternoon.

There are 192 persons on the Salt Lake postoffice paid, stating that this office is becoming rapidly one of the important offices of the country.

The Salt Lake stock yards are receiving numerous bunches of fat cattle and mutton sheep for the local slaughterers and packers, for the holiday markets.

John G. Davies of Vernal has filed application with the state engineer for two second feet from the Grand River in Wasatch county, with which to irrigate 80 acres of land.

A Sunday club is being organized at the Y. M. C. A. to promote the religious work of the association. The important committees will include the social, program, Bible study, and attendance committees.

Local storekeepers have started in to decorate their windows and are making a fine display already. The elevator boys have also "taught the fever," and are showing a praiseworthy artistic taste.

James Murphy, a veteran clothing salesman, just back from Colorado, reports the entire southwestern part of that state under two to five feet of snow, so that there is abundant promise for water in that section of the country.

An amendment to the articles of incorporation of the Henry Wagon Breeding company of this city has been filed in the county clerk's office by which the capital stock of the company was increased to \$200,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each.

Captain M. M. Woods, superintendent of the Associated Charities, has 22 people out listing genuine cases of need in town, which will be relieved by donations from the Christmas tree of the association. Charitably disposed people are asked for donations of clothing.

The report of the city board of health for the week ending Dec. 15 shows 20 births, 13 males and 7 females. They were 19 deaths, 12 males and 7 females. Eight cases of contagious diseases were reported, consisting of one case of diphtheria, one scarlet fever, five cases of smallpox and one of measles.

Hereafter all claims and bills against the state must be presented to the secretary of state not later than the Saturday before the third Monday in each month in order that they may be approved by the state board of examiners at the regular meeting which occurs on the third Monday.

Architect S. C. Dallas has prepared sketches for a permanent state or interstate fair, modeled after the style prevailing at the great fairs of the last 10 or 12 years in the United States, as suggestive of what might be done on the Utah State fair grounds with a definite aim and purpose as to buildings in view.

Jesse Walter, a deserter from the Nineteenth Light battery, was arrested last night by the police, and turned over to the Fort Douglas authorities.

Mrs. McGovern, mother of Dr. W. A. McGovern who married Mrs. D. C. McGovern of this city, has just died in England. The doctor is now a resident of San Francisco.

The bill of the city amounting to \$2,257.50 for rent of the court room and private office occupied by the criminal division of the district court since September, 1903, has been allowed by the county commissioner. The rooms will be vacated on Dec. 31, and Judge Armstrong will move into his new court room on the third floor of the city and county building.

At last night's meeting of the Men's club of the First Congregational church, Hon. Fisher Harris made a fine address on "See Europe if you can, see Europe if you must, see Europe if you will, but see America first." The address was an eloquent one, fully up to the speaker's reputation for making fine speeches, and he made a great hit. Piano solos were given by Prof. Radcliffe, and refreshments were served.

Next Thursday evening, friends of the National guard, and especially of company H, will have an opportunity of seeing what the company can do in the line of managing an entertainment. The "Company H Benefit" has been planned for the past month, and for two weeks rehearsals have been held nightly in the armory building. The consequence is that the production is well finished, and ready to go on without a hitch. The state band, selected for place in the anthem contest originated by a morning paper, will be sung, while another feature will be patriotic songs and tableaux.

## HAWAII FAVORS IT.

Will Do Everything Possible for "See America First" Movement.

The Hawaiian Islands will be represented at the coming "See America First" conference in this city, as on Dec. 5, the following resolution was passed at a public meeting in Honolulu: "Resolved, That the Hawaii Promotion committee is in thorough and hearty accord with the Commercial club of Salt Lake City, Utah, in the movement inaugurated by that body looking to the diversion of at least a portion of the very large European tourist traffic toward our great west, which has so much to offer the traveler and homesee. And be it further:

"Resolved, That the chairman is hereby authorized to appoint a delegate or delegates to the 'See Europe if you can, see Europe if you must, see Europe if you will' convention, to be held at Salt Lake City, Utah, Jan. 25, 1906."

The following editorial bearing on the same subject appeared in the Pacific Commercial Advertiser of Honolulu Dec. 4, 1905:

"This territory should keep in touch with the movement started by the Commercial club of Salt Lake City. 'See Europe if you wish, but see America first,' the motto adopted, has taken at first, with the cities of the Pacific coast. With local promoters, leaders, as well as with the Salt Lake City organization, H. P. Wood, secretary of the Hawaii Promotion committee, has already had a good deal of correspondence on the subject. He has made it well understood in his communications that Hawaii will not go into the movement as a 'possession,' but as a locally self-governing territory of the United States."

"Hawaii occupies a position, too, where it can give something to the American home-seeking tourist, proposition, as well as look for some benefit therefrom. In return for being taken into account in the general propaganda of information about attractive spots in America, Hawaii can greatly assist the cause of localities west of the Mississippi on the mainland from the advantage of the Hawaiian Islands, holds up transpacific routes of travel. For value received in similar kind, the Hawaii promotion committee can make its information bureau very valuable to mainland places. It can give an effective display of maps showing the best stopping off places for traveler-seeking, besides laying before the traveler full particulars of passenger rates, hotels and their charges, specific itineraries of travel to suit the time and means of inquirers, etc."

"The Salt Lake movement is bound, anyway, to benefit Hawaii incidentally. Whatever brings eastern people out to the Pacific coast will be beneficial to these islands, both directly and indirectly. On the other hand, the movement to learn more about Hawaii than they knew before, with the chances in favor of many being induced to extend their journey to the Hawaiian Islands, will benefit the Pacific coast and of permanent settlers in that section, both will enhance its value as the nearest market for Hawaiian products."
