SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 15.—During the

reading of the journal a message

was received from the House an-

ouncing that the Speaker had

signed a number of bills, among

them the deficiency appropriation

bill, all of which were immediately

signed by the Vice-President.

Cockrell said it had been his in-

tention to offer resolutions of re-

spect to the memory of his late

colleague, Boggs, before the holiday

recess, but after consideration with

Senators it had been thought best

to defer the matter until after the

holidays. He would do so on Janu-

ary the 16th.

Butler submitted a resolution for

the investigation of the discharge

of the committee on elections from

consideration of his credentials as

the extra session, but Cameron of

Wisconsin objected on the ground

that the resolution was a violation

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 15.—The dem-

ocratic side, under the lead of
