President's Ideas on Anti-Race Suicide Dominate Mrs. Jan Kubelik.

Jan Kubelik, the violinist, has just arrived in America. He has the largest number of concert engagements of any artist that has ever honored this country.

On his concert tour this season, Kubelik is accompanied by his wife, who was Countess Czaky-Szell, daughter of a Hungarian family of ancient lineage. She has been married four years and she has four children—Marie and Anne, twin girls, Hanna and Claire, one 18 months, and the other a wee infant of eight months.

Asked as to her views on President Roosevelt's anti-race suicide, Mme. Kubelik replied: "I believe in having a large family, if you have married a man that you love with all your heart. The children that God sends are all right, but not more."

"Do you think the Roosevelt idea of eight or 10 children in each family the proper one?"

"I think," she said, "that the four babies I have are enough for me. They are lovely children, and they look like their father, they are clever like he is. I do not know if there were others what they would be like. They might not be like him, so I am content with these."

Mme. Kubelik looks more than a countess, although she is not tall and gawky. Her hair is very light brown and wavy; she has big brown eyes and a lovely Teutonic complexion. Her English is charming, though fragmentary, but she is shy with it, as though it were an unruly horse she was mounting for the first time.

"I hope that all of my daughter will marry American men, I am looking for four husbands for my girls in this country. I shall be pleased to be the mother-in-law of four handsome American men."

"They say that I will make a good mother-in-law," she added, laughing.

"American women? They are the smartest looking women I have yet seen. They are well groomed. With their smart gowns and chic appearance they make me think I am again in Paris, viewing the exquisite Parisian toilettes, but they are more beautiful than the Parisian women."

Mme. Kubelik seemed pleased with America, on the whole.

"New York hotels are beautiful," she exclaimed. "They are almost like castles in their magnificence."

"I do not believe much in the eating of meat," she asserted. "It will spoil the figure. Fruit and vegetables form a better diet."

Mme. Kubelik is delighted when talking of her children.

"Before leaving home," she said, "we gave a large reception in the Castle Borchy, and the twins enjoyed it as much as anyone. They marched around, with American flags in their hands, shouting 'Hip, hip, hooray for America!' They wanted very much to come with us, and Marie asserted, 'I'm going to learn to play on the violin, then I'll go to America, and the people will say, Bravo Kubelik for me.' Anne joined in the chorus to come and the desire to be a violinist."

"Their parting request was for their father to salute America in their names with 'Hip, hip, hooray!' They are very fond of music and will listen intently for hours to Herr Kubelik's playing, and often after he has finished they are able to sing the entire selection."
