

## DEMONSTRATION IN TAFT'S HONOR

Introduced at Banquet in Manila  
As Future President of the  
United States.

### GIVEN A SILVER LOVING CUP.

Well satisfied with condition of Philippines—Warned Those Who Sought To Sow Dissension.

Magla, Oct. 21.—There was a great demonstration here tonight in honor of Secy. Taft, the occasion being a banquet arranged by a committee composed of members of the general assembly.

The secretary was cheered for five minutes when introduced with the statement that "there is no man to whom the Philippines owe more than to the future president of the United States." The nationalists being especially demonstrative. A silver loving cup or native made was presented to the secretary who, in expressing his thanks, said he was gratified when he heard President Obama say the United States had kept its promise made to the Filipinos both in letter and in spirit, and urged that the importance of education in order to overcome the tendency to blindly follow one man. It was necessary to give all an equal opportunity so that the son of the humble peasant might aspire to the highest possible position in the state. He was confident that the assembly would unite with him to procure legislation in better existing conditions. His speech in conclusion was the best as delivered to the filipino Congress.

President Roosevelt was introduced by Congressman John Sharp Williams.

When the president arose to reply the big crowd accorded him a noisy demonstration that lasted several minutes.

Immediately after closing his address President Roosevelt and party were rapidly driven to the Yauco & Magadip railway station, where a special train stood in waiting.

At 5:30 the train pulled out for Memphis, where the president is scheduled to arrive shortly after midnight.

**PRESIDENT PAYS  
FLYING VISIT TO VICKSBURG.**

Vicksburg, Miss., Oct. 21.—After a lengthy sojourn in the cakewalks and saloons, braced and vigorous, President Roosevelt paid a flying visit to Vicksburg this afternoon. The president arrived at Delta, just across the river, at 1 o'clock. He was met by the steamboat Belle of the Bend with a delegation of 100 representative citizens on board. The president immediately embarked and passed by a dozen boats, yachts, and other craft, made his entry into the city. The bluffs overlooking the river were lined with people, who gave the chief executive a hearty and unanimous reception. President Roosevelt, accompanied by General and Mrs. Major Griffith and Senator D. B. DeLoach, the parasite which passes through the principal streets, to the national cemetery.

**PLAQUE IN SEATTLE.**  
Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 21.—The appearance of the bubonic plague in Seattle has been taken official notice of by the government offices in Tacoma, and every precaution is being established along the water front.

Every vessel arriving in port with a Chinese or foreign crew is checked up at once by the immigration officers, who are on the decks constantly. The attention of the different masters of vessels has been called to the carelessness in which the funnels are fastened on the line, which causes the steamers and ships to the wharves.

None of the Chinamen will be allowed to go ashore for leave of absence unless they have proper certificates from their superior officers, and the same precaution will be established at the railroad stations.

**MINING IN NEVADA.**

Schwab Corrects a Wrong Impression  
As to What He Said.

Cobre, Nev., Oct. 21.—Charles Schwab in his private car today gave the following to an Associated Press representative:

"A wrong impression was created by me, San Francisco, in my interview regarding Nevada. Which I wish to correct. In discussing Nevada mining, I stated that the representations made to me and my associates regarding Nevada mining properties had proven untrue. I regretted this exceedingly as it had destroyed the confidence of investors. In no sense, however, did I refer to the people of Nevada for whom I have the greatest admiration and regard."

He said that his concern had been in the habit of making quarterly statements and that each mining company should publish statements showing what money they had received from the sale of stock and what they did with it. He commended the act of the last Nevada legislature in establishing a public commission which was trying to segregate the honestly developed mines from the mere locations for stock selling purposes with no actual develop-

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## MULA HAFIG SCORES VICTORY

Defeats Forces of Sultan Abdel Aziz, Being Overwhelmingly Successful.

### STRENGTHENS HIS CLAIMS.

Issues Notice That He Guarantees Protection of All Foreigners  
In Morocco.

Tangier, Oct. 21.—On Oct. 17, between Shawta and Mequinez, occurred the first battle between forces of Sultan Abd el Aziz and Mula Hafig, pretender to the throne and known as the sultan of the south. The latter was overwhelmingly victorious and the triumph is of great importance, as strengthening sentiment in favor of Mula Hafig.

According to reports just received from Mazagan, eight regiments of the pretender's troops, under command of Mula Hafig, defeated the sultan's troops and captured several pieces of modern field artillery, together with Caif Rustum, the sultan's chief-of-staff and chief executive.

During the night of Oct. 17 some of Mula Hafig's men made a third raid on the custom house at Mazagan and seized 100,000 cartridges and on the following night they made a fourth raid on the same place and captured 200,000 cartridges.

The arrival of the Imperial troops, consisting of 800 men, descended for Mazagan, arrived at Tangier today. Communication with Mazagan is interrupted. The officials at Mazagan have received information to the effect that Mula Hafig had started on Oct. 17 for Charah, the district between Tangier and Fez.

It has issued a notice to the effect that he guarantees the protection of all foreigners who have gone to Mazagan, eight regiments of the sultan's troops are to return to Mazagan City and resume their business there and ordering his representatives to furnish them with everything necessary to enable them to make the return trip to the capital of the south.

Hafig is shown as a strong hand in controlling the Moorish sects which are demanding the proclamation of a holy war, to which he is unalterably opposed.

Some of Raisul's followers have deserted him and come to Tangier. The native report of the occurrence gives as reason for the desertions that Hafig is retarding the French interests.

The ambushing of a French reconnoitering party proceeding yesterday from Casa Blanca in the direction of Taddert, resulting in the killing of Capt. Jandy and a private of the Chasseurs d'Afrique and the wounding of six men, will, it is said, tend to increase the animosity of the French troops commanded by Gen. Daudet.

The impotency of the disturbance in the southern part of the empire is proved by the departure from here today of the French squadron. The warships are running south under full steam. They are mobilized by means of the wireless telegraph.

**SULTAN PAWS HIS JEWELRY.**

**SULTAN PAWS HIS JEWELRY.**  
P.S., Oct. 21.—The government has full information of the desperate financial plight of the sultan of Morocco, who has only sufficient funds to last a few days. Temporary relief has been obtained through the conclusion of a loan of \$20,000 upon the Imperial treasury and this money will be sent to the sultan by cable. Larger sums, however, are urgently needed by Abd el Aziz. The government will remain true to the Algeciras conference, although it is recognized that unless the legitimate sultan is supported his brother, Mula Hafig, is likely to proclaim a holy war, which would mean the loss of a single European remaining in the interior of Morocco and complete anarchy in the interior for years to come. France, therefore, considers that the interests of all the powers will be served by rendering every assistance possible to Abd el Aziz, but she repudiates the suggestion that it is intended to profit by the sultan's straits to the breaking of a valid contract.

The question involved is whether an officer or several of his regiment should be sent. It came up in an attempt to enforce the commodity freight rate law enacted by the last legislature. Young, acting on behalf of the railroads, filed suit in the state supreme court to compel the railroads to revise their rates according to the state law.

The charge is conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with coal land entries in San Juan county, N. M.
