The Seeling Salt Lake City car has been doing a land office business the past week.

The great 10,000 horse power electric plant of the Telluride company in Pando canyon is approaching completion.

Secy. Alfred Stillman of the Pacific board of underwriters, will arrive in this city early in the week on a business trip.

Contractor Campbell is erecting at the Federal building the new steam hoist just received from the east, and will operate the electric and steam hoists together.

Cashier Miller of Wells-Fargo bank has so far recovered from his typhoid fever attack that he has been removed to his home, and expects to be out again in a week.

Car 40, the last double truck car made in Salt Lake shops of the street railway company, is now being equipped with its electric plant for operation as soon as possible.

Landlord Mulford of the White House and family returned Saturday from a four months' absence in England visiting with the family of Mr. Mulford's father. They had a very enjoyable trip and a pleasant ocean voyage.

Laying concrete on North State street began today, and after the 10 days of setting, the asphalt will be laid. The street railway company has already done its share in laying the new track and Belgian pavement over the roadbed.

The joint M. L. A. of the Twenty-third ward will open the winter's work tomorrow evening with a regular session until 9 o'clock, after which there will be a dance. The officers of the associations are hopeful for a profitable season's work.
