New York, Oct. 12 .- An escort of naher mounted soldiers which accom-panled a party of Europeans from Fez, was attacked on returning 40 miles from Tangler and robbed of everything, ways a Times dispatch from Tangler, Fwo of the soldiers were wounded.

Five Moorish soldiers were wounded. Five Moorish soldiers were murdered ast week by tribesmen between Tetuan ind Tangler. Fighting between the Gharb and Be-ti-Hassan tribe has completely devas-pated the whole of the former's district.

San Francisco, Oct. 11.—William Beals, an aeronaut, was almost instant-ly killed today. He made an ascension and descended safely in a parchute to within 40 feet of the ground, when he released his hold on the trapeze bar. He fell on a hard pavement in Golden Gate park and soon died.

SENTENCED TO BE HANGED.

Eight Ladrones Captured in Balcan, Luzon.

Manila, Oct. 12 .- Eight ladrones have Just been sentenced here to be hanged and two to 25 years' imprisonment by Judge Sweeny. These men were cap-tured in Balucan and other provinces of Luzon adjacent to Manila. A second body of ladrones are in the island of Panay, while they have at-tacked the town of Ibajay and killed 13 of the inhabitants. There is only a small police force there.

A HEROIC LABORER.

Man With Broken Back Refuses to Tell News to Alarm His Mother.

New York, Oct. 12 .-- The Bellevue New York, Oct. 12.--The Bellevue hospital doctors, accustomed to sad scenes, have been startled by the self-sacrifice shown by John Conroy, a la-borer, whose back was broken by a fall received while at his work. Con-roy was taken to the hospital and upon being asked for his address and that of his nearest Triend, told the doctors his mother was seriously ill and that his mother was seriously ill and that should she learn of his accident she undoubtedly would die. Finally he gave an address, but it proved to be fictitious. His sister and the dying mother were much alarmed at his non-appearance and finally the former be-gan the rounds of the hospitals. At Bellevue, the search was rewarded, but she had arrived too late. Her brother had passed away only a few minutes before she arrived.
