

ROBERT WIDDESON SHOOTS HIMSELF

Well Known Park City Blacksmith
Commits Suicide in His Barn
This Afternoon.

(Special to the "News.")
Park City, July 22.—A shotgun arranged in his barn and its trigger pulled by a string was the instrument of suicide adopted by Robert Widdeason, Jr., of this city at 2:30 this afternoon. Despondency following domestic trouble are believed to have caused him to take his own life. He was found by members of his family when they rushed to the barn following the report of the shotgun, which he had evidently fixed in its position earlier in the day. When found, he was lying in a pool of his own blood and was dead. The charge from the shotgun lodged in his breast tearing his body to pieces and tearing the heart and lungs to shreds.
Widdeason has been a blacksmith in Park City for many years, owning his own shop here. He married Annie Long in this city several years ago and two small children and his widow survive him. He was a son of Robert Widdeason of the Nineteenth ward in Salt Lake City and a nephew of former Mayor Ezra Thompson of Salt Lake. He was 40 years of age. During his life in this camp he was well known and had many friends.

R. R. LYMAN NAMED ONGOOD ROADS BOARD

University Professor Selected as Member of Commission to Improve Highways of State.

Prof. Richard R. Lyman of the University of Utah was named by the board of regents of the institution at a special meeting held today as a member of the state road commission. As soon as the board of trustees of the Agricultural college of Logan names a member of its faculty, the commission will be complete and work of the commission will be taken up. The other members of the commission provided for by acts passed by the legislature are Gov. William Spry, chairman; Atty. Gen. Albert R. Barnes and State Treasurer David M. Mason.
Under the four acts passed by the legislature an appropriation of \$27,000 was made to be expended each year for the improvement of roads. The counties in which the roads are to be built will pay for the improvements. The commission has the power to select roads which shall comprise the system of state roads. The commission will furnish the plans and estimates for permanent road construction on application of the county commissioners in whose county improvements are to be made. The county commissioners are authorized to levy a special road tax for improvements decided upon by the commission.

JENNINGS CORNER BRINGS HIGH PRICE

Well Known Business Block on Main
And First South Changes Hands.

The sale of the historic Main street corner, known for years as both the Eagle Emporium corner, and the Jennings block was consummated yesterday. The negotiations have been pending for some time with the owner, Mrs. Priscilla P. Jennings on one side, and the Upton Realty company on the other, but the deed was not filed until Wednesday. The property is one of the best known pieces in Salt Lake, stands on the corner of Main and First South streets, and is at present occupied by the Utah National bank, which has a lease of five years, with a renewal privilege of three additional years. The sale was made through the well known real estate agent, E. B. Wicks, but for some reason he is very non-committal as to the aims and purposes of the purchasers, though the papers on file in the county building show he is one of them, his fellow-incorporators in the Upton Realty company being F. R. Chandler, Dr. John Peppers, E. H. Johnson and W. H. Hurd.
The dimensions of the realty are 36 1/2 feet frontage on Main street by 11 1/2 feet on First South, and the price received by Mrs. Jennings was \$125,000, which means a little better than \$4,000 per foot for the Main street frontage. This is the record price for realty in that part of the city.

The corner, which was the cause of some famous litigation in the old days, was originally located on the east part of the holding of William Richards, in 1847. From him it passed to President Brigham Young, who sold the corner to William Jennings, and he conducted a small butcher and grocery store there in the later 50's and early 60's. It later became the home of the Jennings store, one of the leading concerns of the days, before the organization of Z. C. M. I.

A claim was laid to the property by the heirs of Joseph Caine, and the case was bitterly contested in the courts for years, Mr. Jennings finally being successful. The Utah National bank today the cashier, Mr. Badger, said he had no knowledge whatever of the aims of the purchasers, and in fact he had been holding the rent paid by the bank for two months, awaiting the result of the negotiations being made by Mr. Wicks. Turner had it some time ago that the purchaser of the corner was Z. C. M. I., but Superintendent Webber says the rumor was totally unfounded.

WANLESS BOUND OVER.

Without attempting an excuse, and without even the tone of regret, Alex. Wanless, Jr., the 19-year-old youth, arrested yesterday after four bad checks had been traced to him, pleaded guilty this morning to the charge of forgery, and was bound over to the district court for sentence.
During the past half month Wanless had forged four checks, three of them with the name of Thomas A. Birkingham and one with the signature of John Sharp. The latter check, stolen from the press room of the Magazine Printing company, led to his identification as the forger for whom the police had been looking. The checks forged by Wanless were all for small sums, ranging about \$18, and in three of the cases he passed the checks at jewelry stores, making small purchases of jewelry.
When arrested yesterday he admitted the forgeries but gave no explanation for his acts other than that he "needed the money."
The complaint against Wanless was sworn to by David Stein and was confined to only one of the forged checks.

REV. CLEMENSON BIDS FAREWELL TO UTAH

Has Accepted a Call to a California
Pastorate, for Benefit of
Wife's Health.

LOGAN, July 21.—The Rev. Newton E. Clemenson, for the past 15 years, pastor of the local Presbyterian church, will preach his farewell sermon to the local congregation on Sunday, July 25, when he will present his resignation. Rev. Clemenson has accepted a call to the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church in Anaheim, California, where he occupied the pulpit the last two Sundays in June and the first two Sundays in July.
He gives for the main reason in accepting this new position, that it is in hopes that his wife, who has been suffering from a mental and physical breakdown for the past two years, will be able to regain her health by the change from the high to the lower altitude. For the two years that Mrs. Clemenson has been sick, her husband has had to be in almost constant attendance, being chore boy as well as nurse. She was taken to California about a year and a half ago and soon made a great improvement but on returning home was forced in a day or two to again take to her bed and has been a sufferer ever since.
Rev. Clemenson's congregation here consists of an enrollment of 35 persons, although at present he has not that number, as many have moved away since the first of the year.
Since coming to Logan, his mission has been that of fighting the Mormons. It was he who traveled throughout the east during the "Smoot" investigation, dealing out what he termed "X-rays on Mormonism." Since that time his influence in Logan has been far below par. Socially and otherwise he has not cut a very big figure.
