The fireman escaped with severe bruises about the legs, while Harry Hill, telegraph operator, who was riding on the bumper of the locomotive was buried under the debris and crushed into an unrecognizable mass. Mike Toohy, a switchman, was also on the engine, but jumped and escaped uninjured. The loss to the railroad is about \$25,000.

PORT JERVIS, N. Y., 14.—Henry H. Farnum, president of the National Bank of Port Jervis, died this morning, aged 71. He was married six days ago and leaves to his widow \$1,000,000.

CINCINNATI, 14.—The weather is clear and pleasant. There will undoubtedly be a large vote polled. Up to noon about the average number had voted. George W. Williams, colored, republican for representative, is being erased from the ticket by many republicans. Lewis G. Bernard, democratic candidate for clerk of the common pleas court is being served in the same manner by many democrats. Little attention is paid to the constitutional amendment. In Avondale it is stated that 40 democrats voted the straight republican ticket. In the Second Ward also several hard money democrats scratched Ewing. From republican sources it is declared there have been republican gains in the 1st, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd and 23d Wards. Several arrests were made by police of ticket holders, but were all released shortly afterwards.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., 14.—Rev. H. H. Hayden has been indicted for the murder of Mary Stanard.

#### FOREIGN.

LONDON, 14.—It is thought the Roumanian government's bill for the emancipation of the Jews will not obtain the two-thirds majority requisite to its passage.

A Simla dispatch says: The magazine which was blown up by the Afghans on the night of the 8th inst., was in camp outside the city. The magazine in the Bala Hessar is intact.

A Lahore dispatch of the 13th says: Jellalabad was occupied today by three British regiments with four guns. Allabad and the Bala Hessar will be victualled for five months. The Ameer approved all that has been done now that the fight of the mutineers has averted the danger of sacking Cabul.

A crowd of 2,000 persons was present at the funeral of a communist in the cemetery of La Villette, France, to-day. A member of the socialist committee read a speech declaring the people should demand, and, if necessary, exact justice for the heroes who saved France. The speaker was enthusiastically applauded.

Bismarck recently expressed a desire to see England join the Austro-German alliance.

In the small village of Genijesk, Southern Russia, 30 persons have died from accidentally eating poisonous fish.

There are grave apprehensions in Constantinople of serious disturbances during the coming winter. The prevalence of robbery and murder at present is considered the premonitory symptoms.

If gold continues to leave England and France as it has lately, it will soon become necessary to consider the possibility of a measure to stop the overflow. It will be time for England to consider what action to take when the French authorities make a move by directly or indirectly raising the premium on gold to such a point that the whole incidence of the United States demand is thrown on this country.

The *Republique Francaise*, the organ of Gambetta, continues the advocacy of plenary amnesty. It is certain if Waddington is overthrown Gambetta will not accept the office, and Grevy would be obliged to summon Paul Challamel La Cour, who would associate with himself. A number of extremists whose names alone would have the effect of alarming France and Europe.

The language of the radical press is becoming outrageous and is largely copied by the reactionary papers.

The *Marseillaise* reviewing the accusations made against Puteaux Humbert of complicity in the Chaudes execution, warns the reactionaries that it is better in their own interest to use the word "execution" as little as possible. They should beware of reminding the radicals that the as-

sassins of the communist leaders are still unpunished. Bontillier, another extreme radical has been elected member of the Paris municipality.

The St. Petersburg committee of the volunteer fleet has ordered a fifth cruiser to be constructed to cost £100,000.

Five hundred tenants of the Marquis of Sligo and Earl of Lucan met near Westport, County Mayo, Ireland, and solemnly pledged themselves to pay no rent until a reduction should be granted proportionate to the great fall of prices of all kinds of agricultural produce. Notice was posted at Warren Point, County Down, that any man coming into the county to pay more than a pound an acre for land may bring his coffin with him.

The Pope, on Friday, underwent a slight surgical operation, but is not confined to his bed.

Edward Levy Dawson, of the *Daily Telegraph*, has brought action against Tabouche for statements in the latter's paper, the *Truth*, growing out of the recent street affray between those journalists.

Sir Frederick Roberts and staff visited the late residency at Cabul, portions of which are burned, but the greater part is still standing, though completely gutted. The bodies of Maj. Cavagnari and Dr. Kelly are said to be buried beneath the pile of debris and charred logs at the end of the court yard. Search will be made. Maj. Cavagnari's visiting diary has been found at the Ameer's palace.
